

Rainiers Drop 4th Straight; Bevos Shaded

Portland Nipped 3-2 By Surging San Diego Nine

Unless the Seattle Rainiers can find some miracle cure in Manager Jo Jo White's medicine chest, they stand to lose their grip on second place in the Pacific Coast league.

The Rainiers are now embarked on what might be construed as a full fledged losing streak. Nobody, least of all Jo Jo, has been able to name the mystery malady.

The Sacramento Solons handed Seattle its fourth straight setback last night (Wednesday), a 3 to 2 ritual performed largely by Walt Drupe and Jim Tabor. Drupe drove in three Solon runs with a single and a double, while Tabor batted in the other two. He collected a single, a double and a triple in four trips.

The defeat put the Rainiers nine games behind the Hollywood Stars, who beat San Francisco.

The Twinks belabored the Seals for 16 hits and a 12 to 0 victory. The process was swift and thorough, with Pinky Woods pitching the shutout.

Once again San Diego arises as a contender for the number two spot, the focal point of interest in the pennant chase. The Padres shaded Portland, 3 to 2, in a pitching duel between Hal Saltzman of the Beavers and Lyman Lunde.

Three costly Portland errors paved the way for their defeat.

Credit Goes To Coach

DALLAS—Glenn H. McCarthy, who made millions from oil and has become a fabulous personality, credits the encouraging words of an admiring football coach with putting him on the road to success.

The Beaumont, Texas, A. and M. club was giving a testimonial dinner to the owner of the swank Shamrock hotel in Houston where the movie stars helped make it a national occasion when the hostelry was opened. McCarthy was born in Beaumont and the home folks were paying him tribute.

Among the 300 guests was Paul Tyson. In the '20s he coached Waco high school to four state football championships and one of them claimed the national title. Tyson is a college professor today but his interest still lies with athletics.

Tyson had been invited by McCarthy to come to Houston and then fly with him to Beaumont in his private plane for the dinner.

Everyone paid tribute to McCarthy but when the multi-millionaire responded he recalled what happened in 1926 when Waco high school played San Jacinto high school of Houston in the quarter-finals of the Texas schoolboy football race.

It was December 3. When San Jacinto came to Waco it was not given a shadow of a chance of stopping the Tyson juggernaut.

But early in the game San Jacinto's right tackle raised out of the line and said: "You won't gain an inch over this place today." The Waco team was amused but he was right. Waco won 35-0 but it never could gain over the fighting McCarthy.

As soon as the game ended, Tyson sought out the husky tackle. "You man," he said, "you put up a great fight out there today. We beat San Jacinto but we didn't beat Glenn McCarthy. If you battle against the odds in the future the way you did on that football field today, you'll really go places."

And so to the folks who paid him tribute in Beaumont, McCarthy had little to say.

"Those were the first encouraging words anybody ever said to me. They went a long way toward putting me on the road to success."

Weather, Pains All Tied Up
LONDON (AP)—A. J. Whitten, 53, is a London taxicab driver, a fellow of the Royal Meteorological Society and an observer of pains and weather.

Government To Aid Hopper Control
RENO, Nev., July 7 (AP)—The federal government promised today to throw its forces into the battle against the plague of grasshoppers moving through Nevada toward Oregon and California.

The federal attack will be made next spring—when the eggs hatch. Poison bait and poisoned vegetation will be placed throughout the area, so that the newly-hatched insects can not survive.

It is too late now for control measures this season. The grasshoppers are about to die anyway, after laying their eggs.

The federal government, the state of Nevada, and Oregon and California if those two states wish to, will cooperate in the control program.

But He's Not Mad Hospital Stay Robs Gus Of Rookie Title

CHICAGO, July 7 (AP)—The big, blond guy wasn't mad at all as he walked shakily away from the hospital bed that possibly kept him from being the American league's rookie-of-the-year.

"It was a tough break, that's all," grinned Gus Zernial, the Chicago White Sox outfielder, leaving Mercy hospital yesterday after a 38-day stay.

Handsome Gus entered the hospital last May 30, two days after a diving try for a fly ball shattered his right collar bone at Cleveland stadium.

At the time, Zernial, leading the American league in hitting with 255, was tops in two-baggers with 17, and was the biggest gate attraction the Sox have had in years.

"Now, I almost have to learn to walk all over again, much less bat and throw a ball," said Zernial, walking out of the hospital arm-in-arm with his pretty wife, Gladys, and their one-year-old daughter, Susan.

The doctor has ordered Gus to start strengthening his legs next week. Then, he'll begin working his repaired shoulder actively in about three weeks, just about when he comes off the inactive list July 28.

Zernial figures he may be able to break into the Sox lineup again about the first week of August.

DODGERS, CARDS DOMINATE NATIONAL ALL-STAR ROSTER

NEW YORK, July 7 (AP)—The Brooklyn Dodgers and St. Louis Cardinals, presently in a dog fight for the pennant, dominate the National league all-star team—even to the extent of the pitching staff.

Bill Southworth of the Boston Braves, who will manage the Nationals, picked eight hurlers. Three of them were Dodgers, and two of them Cardinals.

In all the Dodgers and Cardinals each landed seven players on the 35-man squad, which included First Baseman Eddie Waitkus of the Phillies, as an honorary member. Waitkus is recovering from a gunshot wound inflicted by a crazed girl admirer.

Another surprise nominee to the squad which meets the American league All-Stars in the 16th annual game at Brooklyn's Ebbets field next Tuesday is Ewell Blackwell, Cincinnati's righthander. Blackwell, convalescing from a kidney operation, has only one victory this year.

As expected, Southworth chose Brooklyn's ace, Preacher Roe (8-2) and Ralph Branca (10-2) but his choice of Rookie Don Newcombe (6-2) was another eyebrow lifter. The two Cardinal nominees were

PORTLAND, July 7 (AP)—The big field in the Oregon state tennis tournament began to get down to size today as some divisions entered the quarter-final round.

Portland's Emery Neale, seeded No. 1, still looked like the coming champ in men's singles. He had no trouble at all yesterday in entering the round of eight with a smashing 6-0, 6-1 win over well-regarded Curt Braun, San Mateo, Calif.

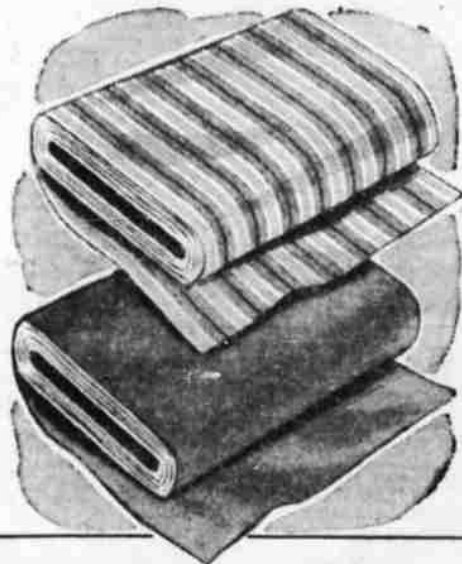
