Fighting With The Greek Guerillas Is 'Different'

FRANKFURT (AP)—What is it like to fight for the Greek guerilla army? If you run out of ammunition, it may take weeks to get more. A lot of the time you can't understand the man who is fighting along side you.

That's the way it is, according to a German who said he "succeeded in getting away" from the communist brigades. His story was quoted in Allied-licensed western-German papers. The man said he was recruited for the rebel army from a German prisoner-of-war camp in Soviet Russia.

There are more than 3,000 Germans fighting in the rebel communist force, he said. The German said he first was taken to a transit camp in Bulgaria. Other German prisoners and "volunteers" from 18 other nations were there, too. They were trained in guerilla tactics by veteran ex-Wehrmacht NCOs and officers.

"Firearms came from the Skoda plant in Czechoslovakia and the Potemkin plant near Odessa, Soviet Union. We had Italian Beretta guns and German machine pistols of the 1942 type. They even supplied us with Hungarian, Russian and Rumanian shot-guns, manufactured around 1900.

Navy Goes All Out For Player

GUAM, July 7 (AP)—A foul ball lopped Seaman Glen E. Friese and the navy was off on another long range rescue mission.

The baseball game was at Ponape, 2600 miles west of Honolulu in the Caroline Islands. The ball hit the head of Friese, whose home is 309 Maple street, Horicon, Wis.

The Ponape doctor feared Friese had a skull fracture. He summoned a volunteer crew for a 14-hour roundtrip to bring the seaman to the navy hospital here.

X-rays disclosed no fracture. Guam doctors said Friese should recover quickly.

Iowa Vets Bonus Blanks Available

Iowa World War II bonus forms are now being distributed, the Oregon department of veterans' affairs was informed this week, but eligible veterans must write direct to Iowa to obtain them because "bulk distribution of forms is not being made beyond the borders of Iowa."

A letter from the Iowa bonus agency advises veterans to write the World War II service compensation board, Des Moines, for the necessary blanks, giving their full name, serial number and branch of service.

Next of kin of deceased Iowa veterans should request Form No. 2, and state their relationship to the deceased.

The Iowa bonus pays \$10 for each month of domestic service and \$12.50 for each month of foreign

duty, up to \$500, to veterans who were residents of Iowa for at least six months prior to active duty in World War II, and who served a minimum of 120 days between September 16, 1940 and December 31, 1946.

The surviving unmarried widow, children or parents of a veteran who died of service connected causes incurred during the war period may receive the \$500 maximum payment. If death was not due to service, the survivor is eligible to receive the amount the veteran would have been paid had he lived.

Active duty under the Iowa bonus law includes all time for which credit was given a veteran in computing his terminal leave, so former enlisted personnel should list in the appropriate space on the application blank the number of months and days for which they received pay under the armed forces leave act of 1946.
