## Butte Valley Survey Nears Completion

Preliminary field work on the U. S. bureau of reclamation survey in Butte valley is expected to be finished around the last of August.

Purpose of the survey which was started in April with two land classification parties at work, is to determine conditions of the soil with regard to its suitability for irrigation. The two survey parties have covered 55,000 acres to date, boring holes in the ground at intervals.

The soil borings are being analyzed for texture and alkalinity and results of analysis are being placed on specially prepared sectional maps to be compiled into one master map of land classification for the area. From the map an estimate of repayment ability for the area will be made on cost of construction to bring water to the valley.

Another USBR field party has resumed the topographic survey on Sprague river to assist in determining possible reservoir sites and stream regulations for flood control and irrigation supply.

Progress on this survey is slow because much of the area is covered by timber and under heavy brush, but it is going along satisfactorily, and the bureau hopes to complete the topography on the lower part of the Sprague sometime this fall.
