Van's Awarded Light Contract

LAKEVIEW, July 8.—The contract for materials for installing 30 mercury vapor street lights on Lakeview's downtown streets went to Van's Electric service Friday night, July 1, when the town council opened the three bids submitted. Van Thompson's low bid was \$3045.60 for the 30 complete units. The lamps chosen are General Electric units of 16,000 lumens. Installation will begin as soon as the materials arrive, and will be done by the California Oregon Power company crew. Local electric firms did not bid on the installation because only employees of Copco are permitted to work on the company's poles and of the 30 lamps 18 will be on Copco poles. The other 12 will be on 30-foot poles to be installed for the purpose.

Crescent Lake Reservoir Funds Asked

Congressman Lowell Stockman of the second congressional district of Oregon announces he has been advised by the bureau of reclamation that investigations of the need for repair and reconstruction work at the Crescent lake dam and reservoir in Deschutes county, Ore., will be included in the 1950 fiscal year program. Some work will be initiated in 1949, and continued during 1950. Crescent lake, owned and operated as an irrigation storage reservoir by the Deschutes county municipal improvement district, which is known locally as the Tumalo project, provides a water supply for lands in the vicinity of Bend. The reservoir is formed by a dam at the outlet of the natural Crescent lake about 50 miles southwest of Bend. The lake is located on Crescent creek, a tributary of the Little Deschutes river, near the crest of the mountain divide between the Deschutes and Willamette rivers. The dam is a 30-foot high log crib, filled with earth and rock. It was constructed in 1922 to form a reservoir with a capacity of about 80,000 acre feet. The storable flow of Crescent creek at the reservoir site has never been sufficient to fill the reservoir. The original plan for the project involved the use of 80,000 acre feet of storage for irrigation. Due to the limitation of water supply, however, aggravated by excessive seepage in project canals and the failure of the off-stream Tumalo reservoir to hold water, the project area has been considerably reduced, in recent years saving only about 7000 acres.
