Drinks, Meals Hard To Get In Reno Now

RENO, Nev., July 8 (AP)—Drinks and meals were still hard to get here today as negotiators in Reno's bar and restaurant labor dispute failed to agree on the major issue.

Both the culinary workers and bartenders union and the Reno employers council said, however, they had pretty well agreed on the matter of wage increases for bartenders and restaurant workers.

But negotiations bogged down on the union's demand for recognition of hotel service workers as under union jurisdiction.

"We feel such recognition would lead to union dominance which would not be healthful to the economic life of the community," said Bernard Hartung, chief negotiator for the employers.

The union denied that contention. "As long as the employers council maintains that attitude the only change in the situation can come when the strike makes itself felt economically," said Dan Johnston, chief spokesman for the union.

Union workers struck several restaurants and bars during the height of the Fourth of July week-end last Sunday. The employers council countered by ordering its members that hadn't been struck to lock their doors.

Of about 100 establishments now closed, the union says it is striking against only 37. The employers council will give no figures on how many bars and restaurants it has closed.

Copco Crews Check Power Poles Here

Eleven student engineers have invaded this area and are making an inventory of pole line facilities for The California Oregon Power company.

The men, working out of the record department of the Copco office, expect to be in Klamath county about three weeks making an actual physical check of each pole and checking it on the map, bringing records and maps up to date.

The record department of the company keeps a complete file of all property, distribution facilities and number of customers receiving service on each line. The history of each pole is recorded here, from the date of its installation, through injuries and service to the time it has to be replaced.

Last physical inventory was made in 1938 and 1939, and there have been some radical changes made in the figures of the company since then.

The present crew, made up of engineering students from Oregon State college and University of Colorado is working under Harold Baughman, foreman. Operating from two sedans, the men go out in the morning and are let out at intervals along the line where they work until picked up at given points at certain times. They average a check of 125 poles per day per man, carrying maps and applying data as they go.

Regulations require that all wires be a minimum of 18 feet above all roads for minimum voltage equipment, higher for higher voltage, and 10 feet above private property.

This is the second county surveyed this year by the crew which finished a check of Douglas county before coming here and will go from here to Siskiyou.
