

Neale Repeats

PORTLAND, July 11 (AP)—Emery Neale of Portland kept the men's singles crown of the 51st Oregon tennis championship tournament in the state yesterday by winning for a fourth time.

But virtually all other titles in the week-long grind at Arlington club courts were rigged off by out-of-state stars after the week-end finals.

Neale defeated hard-playing Glenn Bassett, Los Angeles, 9-7, 3-6, 6-4, 7-5, for the top honors. The women's singles title went to Jean Doyle, San Diego, who defeated Carol Dein, Santa Monica, 6-1, 6-0.

San Franciscans Jim Livingstone and Jim Kroesen held the mens doubles laurels after triumphing over Bassett and Jack Shownaker, UCLA, 6-1, 10-8, 6-2.

The women's doubles were claimed by Misses Doyle and Dein who ousted Jean Kropp, Tacoma, and Mary Green, Vancouver, B. C., 6-0, 6-3.

The mixed doubles were taken by Livingstone and Miss Doyle. They beat Mary and Bill Green, Vancouver, B. C., 6-2, 6-4.

Joltin' Joe May Start

BROOKLYN, July 11 (AP)—Joe DiMaggio may be in the starting lineup tomorrow when the American league's star-studded array faces the National league's best in the 16th annual all-star game at Ebbets Field.

The way was paved for DiMaggio's appearance as a starter when Tommy Henrich, his New York Yankee outfield teammate, and No. 1 choice for the starting right field berth, said he did not think he would be fit to play. Henrich suffered a knee injury a week ago and has been out of the lineup since.

Manager Lou Boudreau of the Americans has given no indication as to who will take Henrich's place, but it would come as no surprise to see Joltin' Joe patrol the right field sector at game time.

Although Boudreau is compelled to start the fans' top selections in a nationwide poll which ended recently, he can substitute any player he sees fit in case of injury to a regular.

Bartender Defends Links Title

LOS ANGELES, July 11 (AP)—The 24th annual national amateur public links golf championship gets under way today, and the title chase is as unpredictable as Texas weather.

Two hundred and twenty players, gathered from all sections of the nation, were listed on the official roll of the United States Golf association for competition in the first round of match play.

Barring scratches, 87 match play battles were on the slate. Forty-six contestants drew byes. The full field represents survivors of sectional qualifying play of an original field of 2482 public links golfers throughout the country.

The tournament is being held at the sparkling new municipal course, the Rancho Golf club, a par 35-36-71 layout stretched over 6805 yards of gently rolling terrain in West Los Angeles on the fringe of Culver City.

The defending champion is Mike Ferents of Long Beach, Calif., a bartender who beat Ben Hughes of Portland, Ore., 2 and 1, for the title last year at Atlanta, Ga.

Hoop Playoff Locales Set

PORTLAND, July 11 (AP)—High school class B basketball state tournament play will be staged at Astoria next winter and the class A play will again be at Eugene.

The Oregon School Activities association said the three years run of the B school playoff at Arlington and at Union last year failed financially. Attendance was off at both places.

Tom Pigott, OSA secretary, said the Astoria Athletic association will sponsor the tournament in the 2800 capacity armory.

A shift of the class B meet to Oregon State college was considered but the University of Oregon site has proved financially successful and popular, OSA officials said.

Pigott said the dates would remain about the same as the past winter's tournaments.

Ceiling Projector Will Speed Hours In Sick Room

Relief from the long, dragging hours of a sick room is being offered at the city library in the form of a ceiling projector, placed there for lending purposes by the three Klamath chapters of Beta Sigma Phi.

The projector is an ingenious device for providing full-length books for bed-ridden people without having a heavy book to hold, or eyes strained from reading.

Page by page, the book is reproduced on the ceiling directly above the patient's head. The projector through which the microfilm book is imaged is controlled by the patient himself. Pages are "turned" by pressing the second button of a three button switch. The first button turns on the machine and the third reverses it for re-reading previous pages.

The project was undertaken several months ago by the three chapters, Kappa, Tau, and Xi Delta, and money was raised through food sales, rummage sales and in many small ways which mounted up to the nearly \$200 needed for the projector and a small supply of microfilm books.

The equipment is kept at the city library, and may be borrowed with a regular book borrowing card. A member of Beta Sigma Phi will show the user how the projector is operated and from then on he may operate it himself.

A person need not be a hospital patient, although hospitalized people are welcome to use the projector, since the film and equipment may also be used in private homes.

It is simple to operate and comparatively small in size.

So far the club has bought several books, but more will be added, making a fairly complete library of film. Books range from \$1.45 and up, and anyone interested in contributing may contact any Beta Sigma Phi member. Eleanor Weatherford is general chairman.
