

### Golf Play Enters 2nd Round Honolulu Trucker Beats Par With 31

LOS ANGELES, July 12 (AP)—A Honolulu truck driver, a Phoenix schoolboy and a collegian fresh from a Portland, Ore., graduation procession loomed today as golfers to beat the U. S. public links golf championship.

It isn't as simple as that, because the 24th public as usual is wide open. Any one of the 128 who tee off in today's second round can win it.

But out of the running in the first day's play are the defending champion, last year's runnerup, a former title holder and a couple of Northern California favorite sons, each highly touted in pre-tourney talk.

The best golf of the opening round smoked from the putter of Frank Rutkiewicz, the Honolulu trucker, who carded a 31 on the par 35 first nine to smother Ben G. Hughes, Portland, Ore., a finalist at Atlanta last year, 6 and 5. But another Portlander, Victor Gildmeister, duplicated Rutkiewicz's 31 to outclass George Pueta, Seattle tavern owner, 5 and 4.

Mike Ferents of Long Beach, Calif., the defending champ, fell with a loud thud to still a third Portlander, Thomas A. Marlowe, 28-year-old June graduate of Portland U., 6 and 5. Robert C. Clark of St. Paul, who won the title nine years ago, was beaten by an assistant warehouse manager from Seattle, William L. Korna, 3 and 2.

### Italy Vs. France

BUDAPEST, July 12 (AP)—It will be France vs. Italy in the European zone final of the Davis cup tennis competition.  
The French team eked out a 3-2 triumph over Hungary by splitting the last two singles matches yesterday. Marcel Bernard won the deciding one with a 6-2, 6-4, 6-1 victory over Andras Adam. Hungary's Josef Aasboth then prevailed over French star Robert Abdesselam, 6-2, 7-5, 9-7, but it failed to alter the series result.  
The Italian team had already gained the final by ousting Yugoslavia last week.  
The European zone final is to be completed by July 26. The victor will meet the American zone winner in the United States, August 12-14. The survivor of that series will play the United States, holder of the cup, in the challenge round August 26-28.  
Mexico defeated Cuba, 4-1, in its American zone semifinal and will tackle the winner of the Canada-Australia matches to be played July 22-24 at Montreal.

### Dom DiMaggio Presses Kell In Bat Race

#### Williams, Goodman Hold Down Third, Fourth Hit Spots

CHICAGO, July 12 (AP)—Boston's Dom DiMaggio surged eight percentage points to 338 to climb into leadin' range of Pacesetter George Kell of Detroit with a 345 in the American league batting race.  
Third baseman Kell skidded three points in averages computed through Sunday's games with a total 97 hits in 281 trips. Outfielder DiMaggio had 102 blows in 302 AB's.  
Third and fourth spots were held by two other Red Sox stars. Outfielder Ted Williams boosted his percentage by seven points to 226 while First Baseman Bill Goodman advanced to the top ten circle for the first time with 322.

They were followed by Dale Mitchell, Cleveland, 318; Bob Dillinger, St. Louis, 306; Gerry Priddy, St. Louis, 304; Johnny Pesky, Boston, and Roy Sievers, St. Louis, 302 apiece; and Hank Majeski, Philadelphia, 299.

New York's Joe DiMaggio is increasing along at 350 but has been up only 40 times since returning to the lineup and is not eligible in the top ten ranking.  
In the specialized department, Williams took the lead in two-bagger production with 24 but was surpassed in runs-batted-in by his teammate, Vern Stephens, who posted 86. Williams and Stephens continued their duel in home run output with 29 apiece.  
Dom DiMaggio's 102 hits were tops, while Philadelphia's Eddie Joost maintained the lead in runs with 73. Mitchell and Dillinger continued on top in triples and stolen bases, respectively, with unchanged tallies of 11 and nine.

Adding another victory, Allie Reynolds of New York remained the ace pitcher on percentages with 9-1 for 300. Virgil Fries, Trucks of Detroit, stayed ahead in strikeouts with 99.

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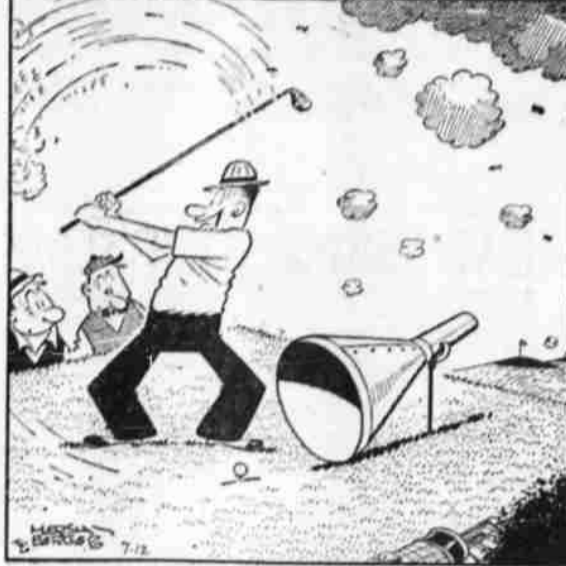

SEATTLE, July 12 (AP)—Cracking the Seattle Golf club course record by one stroke, Harry Givan of Seattle shot a scorching 66 to take the lead yesterday in the opening round of the 48th annual Pacific Northwest Golf association tournament.  
They play another 18-hole qualifying round today to pick the low 32 for match play.  
Givan's seven-under-par performance fractured the old mark held jointly by Don Moe of Portland and Jack Westland of Everett.  
Bill Mawhinney of Vancouver, B. C., was second with 69 and Tom Boucher, King county public links champion, was third with 70.  
Three were tied for medalist honors at the end of the qualifying round in PNOGA women's play—Alice and Marlene Bauer of Los Angeles and Edean Anderson of Helena, Mont., all of whom toured the Broadmoor course in 77.  
The defending champion, Mrs. J. C. Herron of Portland, was fifth with 82. Match play is scheduled today.

3. Improved lighting and a minimum standard of brilliance.  
3. Enlarged visiting dressing rooms.
