

Jury Check Says Judge "Biased"

NEW YORK, July 12 (AP)—The New York Herald Tribune said today that telephone interviews with members of the Alger Hiss trial jury show five think Federal Judge Samuel H. Kaufman was biased in favor of the defense.

The newspaper said two of the 12 jurors stated they do not think the judge showed bias, one declined to take a stand, three had no comment, and the 12th could not be reached.

Judge Kaufman, who has been accused of bias by some members of the house committee on un-American activities, issued this statement last night:

"After conferring with some of the judges in this court I will stand on the record and will not enter any debates. The record speaks for itself."

Trial of Hiss, former state department official, ended Friday night with the jury split eight for conviction and four for acquittal. The government plans to bring Hiss to trial again on the perjury charges.

Standard Oil Faces Charge

LOS ANGELES, July 12 (AP)—Standard Oil company is restrained by court order from refusing to sell gasoline to a serve yourself firm.

Eagle Oil company, operator of 600 filling stations, several of the self-service type, in Los Angeles county, requested the restraining order—granted yesterday. Eagle's suit alleged that Standard Oil tried to prevent it from obtaining petroleum products in violation of anti-trust laws.

The complaint alleged further that Standard requires as a condition of sale that retailers must not sell at prices lower than in Standard-owned or controlled stations. The suit also charged that Standard and other major oil firms—named as co-conspirators but not as defendants—deprived independent stations of gasoline to maintain a price structure, despite a surplus of fuel.

Life Savings Lost, Returned Safely

FLORENCE, July 12 (AP)—A satchel full of money, bonds and jewelry—the life savings of Dr. John Scofield, Eugene—was returned safely yesterday to the physician. He lost them at an auto service station here.

State police said there were \$25,776 in cash, \$14,100 in bonds and an unvalued amount of impressive jewelry. The satchel was turned over to officers by Walt Brynd, who said it was left by an unidentified motorist who had a tire fixed at the Brynd service station.

Dr. Scofield telephoned authorities about the loss and explained he kept the satchel in the rear compartment of his automobile because he did not trust banks.

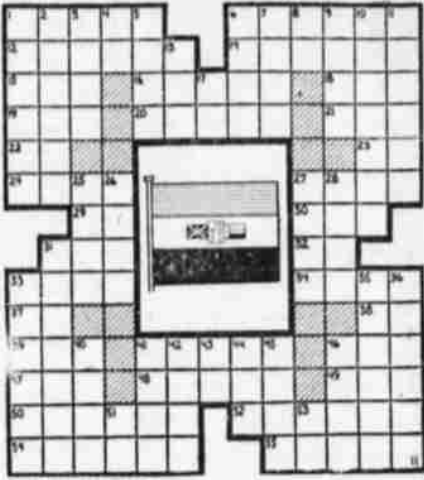

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Rough Water, Tough Course Put Kibosh On Sea Scout Treasure Hunt On Week-End

Rattlesnakes, rough water, damages, and a pretty tough course—all added up to "no treasure" Monday afternoon as Sea Scouts of Scout ship 100 returned weather-beaten and tired—and hungry—from a search of Upper Klamath lake for a gold cup.
