Fort Klamath

At the regular meeting of the Civic Improvement club held in the clubhouse recently further plans were discussed for the forthcoming dedication on Sunday, July 24, of the Jackson F. Kimball Memorial park, located three miles northeast of here on highway 232, at the foot of Sun mountain. Cooperating in arrangements for the event are the Oregon State board of forestry and members of the local women's organization, assisted financially by merchants and business establishments in Fort Klamath.

Clarence C. Williams of the Klamath Falls office of the board of forestry was present at the meeting, and the tentative program which had been outlined for the day was completed with the exception of a few details. As soon as possible, the program will be published by The Herald and News.

The public is cordially invited to attend the opening of the park which will start at noon with a picnic basket lunch, for which coffee and ice cream will be furnished by the board of forestry, with the local club providing cream and sugar for coffee, and members serving the ice cream and coffee to the crowd. The dedication program itself is scheduled to start at 2:30 p.m., and will consist of speeches, musical selections, etc. with John Houston of Klamath Falls as master of ceremonies for the occasion, and Malcolm Epley, managing editor of The Herald and News, delivering the special dedicatory address. Arrangements will be made to care for the large crowd expected to attend the opening of the park, with a special detail of state police officers on hand to direct and control traffic. An honored guest will be Mrs. Jackson F. Kimball, widow of the head of the board of forestry, in whose memory the park is named by the board.

Following the discussion of the dedication program, Williams left for Klamath Falls as master of ceremonies for those present. Reports were heard from the regular standing committees, as well as the special committees in charge of the cooked food sale and dance held June 28, both of which were financial successes.

Mrs. Raymond S. Loosley presented the club with a donation of the premium on two insurance policies issued to the club and church by her husband, who is the local agent for the insurance company, and was given a standing vote of thanks by all at the meeting for the generous

Flanking the unusual centerpiece, at each end of the table small cast-iron kettles were used as containers for summer flowers, both of the wild and cultivated varieties, further carrying out the pioneer idea, with miniature flags used also to accent the Fourth of July holiday. A special gift was presented at this time to Mrs. Denton, a birthday cake decorated appropriately with a liberty bell, July 1 being her birthday anniversary.

TEL AVIV (AP)—The Argentine embassy in the United States forwarded to Israel a request for information on how many gun salutes are fired here for Israeli President Weizman.

Actually the new state hasn't had time yet to work out a lot of these matters. But its protocol department set to work, drew up a code, and replied: "21 guns, as other states do for their presidents."

But the note added, confidentially, that in fact so far they've only been firing five guns—because of the war and munitions supply and all that. (And whether it's five or 21, it is the first time military censorship has passed the fact that Israel has that many guns.)
