

# Assessment Of Counties In State Gains

SALEM, July 13 (AP)—Property assessments listed by the state tax commission for Oregon counties this year total \$1,290,432,438, up \$111,108,124 from 1948.

Multnomah gained \$35,612,975 for a new total of \$519,411,885. Lane ranked second in gain with \$18,612,160 and a total of \$79,923,090. Marion gained \$10,000,000 for a total of \$98,511,030.

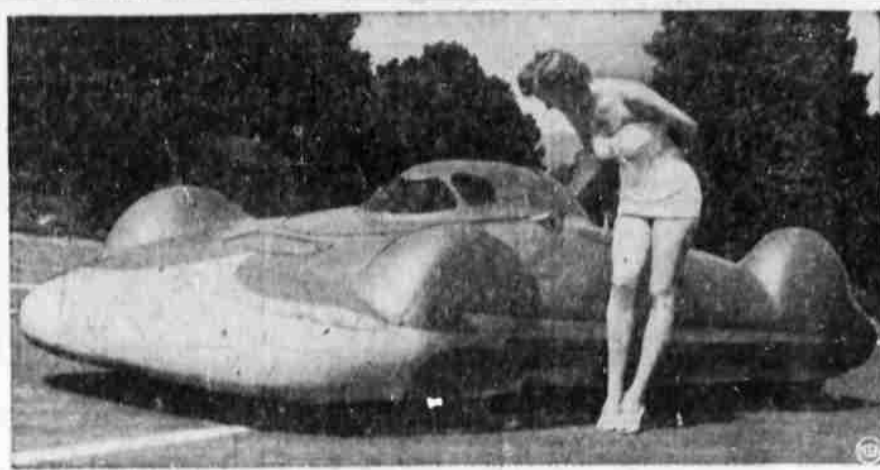
# Legion Calls For Bands

## Wheat Loan Rate To Be Lowered

PORTLAND, July 13 (AP)—Wheat loan rates for county points will average 4 cents a bushel below last year, the state production and marketing administration reported Tuesday.

Terminal loan rates for Portland, Astoria, Longview and Vancouver will be \$2.16, down 3 cents from last year.

NORTH ANDOVER, Mass., July 13 (AP)—William A. Mazarinko and his large, brown bull aren't speaking today—not after what happened Tuesday morning.

Fire broke out in the Mazarinko barn about dawn and Mazarinko called the fire department which rushed apparatus out to the farm—or almost to the farm.

The bull plainly didn't like red fire engines—he just plucked himself in a narrow roadway and challenged the firemen to come on. They didn't.

Doubling as placards, the fire fighters armed themselves with pitchforks and drove the bull back into a field. The bull got loose and came back. The fire was getting worse. The firemen finally penned the bull in a nearby pasture.

By that time the big, wooden barn was beyond saving.

Loss approximated \$12,000.

## Boost In O-C Funds Endorsed

SALEM, July 13 (AP)—A boost of \$250,000 to the recommended funds for Oregon-California agency administration has been endorsed by a U.S. senate appropriations committee.

Charles A. Sprague, chairman of the O & C advisory committee, reported the senate committee action was confirmed by Senator Guy Corson, a committee member. The proposal will go to the senate.

Sprague said the advisory committee had asked a larger increase to avoid curtailment of land management operation in Oregon. He explained a house appropriation had held the fund to last year's budget, but higher fire protection costs and salary increases would have cut back the agency's sales program.

**FLOODS**

SHANGHAI, July 13 (AP)—The mid-Yangtze flood has driven 250,000 persons from their homes, reports from missionaries and river shippers indicated today.

Floods on the Yangtze Huang Ho and smaller rivers in West Central and Southwest China are the worst in 20 years. In some sectors they are described as the worst in history.

which are learned, girls in each session have the opportunity of camping overnight if they wish. The girls attending are divided into several units with adequate supervision for each, and the units plan their own activities.
