Contractors To Furnish Farm Labor

TULELAKE, July 13—A decision to engage three contractors to bring in 300 single male laborers each for the Tulelake crop harvest this year, was reached by the Tulelake Growers association board of directors at a meeting held Tuesday night.

Two of the contractors have been named with the third, either white or Mexican, to be selected later. Clarence Hulet, colored contractor from Woodland who "worked in the area last year and proved himself with the growers" will hire 300 single men and maintain a mess hall for their convenience.

Preston C. Marshall, white, with two colored sub-contractors, George Johnson and E. Hardy, will hire an additional 300 single men and maintain a messhall. This trio comes recommended from the Bakerfield area. They always operate together and hire mostly white help and have worked for large ranching concerns in the Imperial valley.

W. J. Currier, manager of the growers' association, said "We will need all the local men we can get for the harvest this year."

The camp will be operated this year for the single laborers. The decision to use single men in place of families this year was emphasized when barracks buildings used for accommodations last year were turned over to homesteaders this year.

Members present at the directors' meeting were Manager W. J. Currier, President Sam Anderson, Ed Osborne, Ed Duckett, Eldon Larson, Ivan Rose and Marvin Thomas.

New Racket In Germany Uncovered

FRANKFURT, Germany, July 13 (AP)—American officials reported today they have uncovered a gift racket involving the shipment of huge quantities of goods from the United States to phony charitable groups in Germany.

The United States army, three military government agencies and German customs officials have launched a drive to crack the racket. U. S. customs officials said coffee, cigarettes, cocoa, chocolate, nylons, drags are cloth are being shipped to the U. S. occupation zone as gift parcels and then resold on the black market.

Man Takes Own Life On Street Corner

William Douglas Whitney, about 35, took his own life late Tuesday afternoon at the corner of 11th and Walnut with a .22 calibre rifle purchased two minutes earlier.

City police reported Whitney shot himself in the right temple at approximately 4:30, and died at Klamath Valley hospital an hour and a half later.

The man, unknown in Klamath Falls, went into the Western Auto Supply store at 11th and Walnut and purchased the rifle and a box of .22-calibre short shells. He signed the name of Jack Laughlin, Hillsboro, Ore., at the time of purchase.

Then, according to police reconstruction, he walked outside the store building and around the corner on 11th and shot himself.

E. T. Eckel of Pasadena was first on the scene after the shot and found Whitney on the sidewalk, still alive. He went into the state highway department office and had police and Kaler's ambulance called.

Police said Whitney's home address probably was route 2, Hillsboro, and that his wife was believed to reside at 2532 Green street, San Francisco. His mother, and sister, are believed to live in Portland. This morning the man's car was found parked on Pine between 8th and 9th.

The body is at Ward's funeral home.

O'Dwyer To Run For Reelection

NEW YORK, July 13 (AP)—Mayor William O'Dwyer announced today that he will run for reelection.

The mayor said at a news conference: "I deem it my duty in the best interests of the city to run for reelection."

The announcement came a day after the democratic mayor conferred with President Truman in Washington and just after Manhattan District Attorney Frank S. Hogan had been promised the nomination by three of the city's five democratic leaders.

Public Power Fight Opens

WASHINGTON, July 13 (AP)—After talking with President Truman today, Rep. Kirwan (D-Ohio) announced he will lead a fight to restore drastic cuts made by a senate committee yesterday in funds for the administration's public power program.

The senate appropriations committee rejected funds voted by the house for numerous transmission lines in the Middle and Far West.

Kirwan, as chairman of the house subcommittee which handled the interior department appropriations bill, carrying the items, will be a member of the senate-house conference group whose job is to iron out differences between the two branches.

"Most of those cuts are going back into the bill in conference as there will be no bill," Kirwan told a reporter as he left the White House.

He said the senate committee action "just about" scuttled the public power program.

Firemen Extinguish Two Small Fires

City firemen were called out on two fires Tuesday, one a grass fire and the other a small blaze in a sawdust pile.

No damage was done by the grass fire at Sikiyoo and Addison. The call came in to the fire station at 6:38 p. m.

Fire in a sawdust pile at S. 6th and Broad near the Great Northern depot, was soon extinguished without damage. Firemen answered the alarm at 9:29 p. m.

Firemen Answer House Unit Call

The fire in a unit on Chilouquin street was started from an electric plate to near the window curtains. It was quickly put out with small damage caused.

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Driver Drowned By Heavy Truck

LOS ANGELES, July 13 (AP)—Truckdriver Leo Trumowski, 35, was drowned while cranking his truck.

In forward gear, it shot ahead, draped Trumowski over the hood and whirled across the busy coast highway Monday, narrowly missing other cars. The truck nosed over in a slough and pinned Trumowski under the water level.

Police rescue squads arrived in 10 minutes but Trumowski was dead.

Anderson Estate Set At \$16,000

The estate of the late R. H. Anderson, offered for probate at the county clerk's office, is tentatively valued at \$16,000 in real and personal property.

Anderson was killed in an automobile accident June 27. Probate records indicate Anderson also possessed jointly-held property not subject to probate.

He left a will dated April 6, 1927, in which his widow, Mrs. Mae Anderson, and two daughters, Mrs. Thirza DeCew of Klamath Falls and Mrs. Helen Goeckner of Salem, were listed as heirs.

The estate of the late Henry Alden Shelley, is estimated at \$5000. He died June 28. Listed as heirs are two brothers, Bart Hibelley of Beatty and Bert Straley of Dorris, a sister, Lela O'Mally of San Jose, Calif., and a niece and nephew.

A tentative value of about \$1350 has been placed on the estate of William A. Prince, who died June 29 at Bonanza without a will. His sole heir is Mary Marie Hodges, daughter, of Bonanza.

The estate of Arthur Haber, Spangler, who died intestate June 5, is tentatively set at \$500. He left a wife and four children.
