NEWBERG, July 13 (AP)—Earth piled down on a workman in a waterline ditch today, crushing his chest and killing him outright.

He was J. George Forster of Portland, working for his second day on Newberg's \$90,000 sewage disposal project.

Fellow workmen dug him out in a matter of minutes, but Dr. C. A. Bump said Forster had been killed by the force of the earth slide in the ditch. About two feet of earth covered him.

He was employed by P. S. Land mechanical contractors, Portland. The company reported that he had three children.

## Malin Pool Schedule:

MERRILL, July 13 — Merrill youngsters taking swimming lessons at the Malin pool are asked to note the following schedule.

Classes will be held each Monday, Wednesday, and Friday morning for four weeks. Each child must have a swimming suit, towel and 10 cents so that change will not have to be made. No jewelry should be worn. Chaperones will have complete authority at all times, and the children will have to stay in line at all times. Safety rules must be observed while riding on the bus, and any child causing trouble, either at pool or on the bus, will be asked to drop out of classes.

The bus will load and unload at the grade school only, and no extra stops or pick-ups will be made. Children are asked to be at the grade school 10 minutes early so that chaperones may check them in and collect fees.

Bus No. 1 leaves at 9 a. m., returns 10:00 a. m.

Bus No. 2 leaves Merrill 9:50 a. m., returns 11:50 a. m.

Bus No. 3 leaves 10:50 a. m., returns 12:45 p. m.

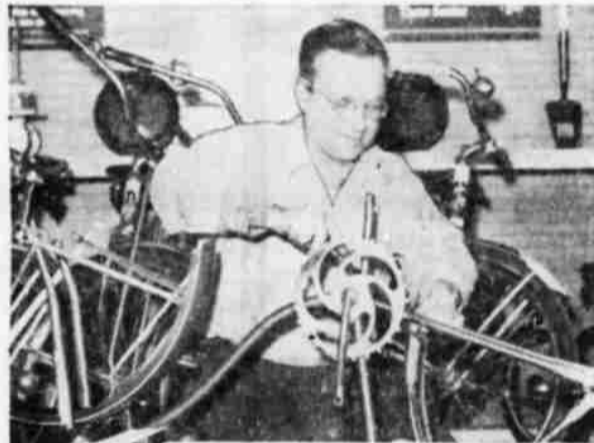
