

Civilian May Be Governor Of Guam Soon

WASHINGTON, July 14 (AP)—The interior department reported today a civilian governor probably will go to Guam next month.

Guam's present governor and military commander of the Marianas, Rear Adm. Charles A. Pownall, is to retire September 1.

James P. Davis, director of interior's division of territories and island possessions, told a reporter plans are under way for a civilian to succeed Pownall.

This, he said, would be the beginning of the interior department assumption of Guam's administration. The navy has governed Guam and American Samoa for almost half a century.

The new governor would be largely responsible, Davis said, for building up a civilian staff that can take over completely from the navy next June 30.

President Truman informed the secretary of state, navy and interior in February, 1948, that upon approval of organic acts for the Pacific Islands, he planned to assign supervision of the islands to the interior department.

Dentists Doing Well In Britain

EDINBURGH, Scotland, July 14 (AP)—A Scottish dentist has made \$25,000 (\$100,000) for 11 months work under Britain's socialized medicine scheme.

This was disclosed by Sir William Marshall, chairman of the Lanark county health service executive council, at a meeting of the dental estimates board yesterday.

Under the national health service, dentists submit a bill to the government for each patient treated. The patient does not have to pay for treatment.

The government pays the dentist according to the number of patients under his care and the kind of treatment given.

Commenting on the case, Sir William said: "It is hard to believe that the patients received the painstaking, careful attention which we have a right to expect in our service."

Owners Abandon Grounded Ship

LOS ANGELES, July 14 (AP)—The crew of the Liberty freighter *Isabella O. Kukulundis*, broken and aground and breaking up on a sandbar 140 miles northwest of here, has been abandoned by her owners to her cargo underwriters.

The 422-foot vessel, with 9000 tons of bulk and sacked wheat aboard, has "broken her back" under constant pounding of waves and is leaking badly. She struck the sandbar Sunday in a heavy fog off Point Arguello in the "graveyard of the Pacific."

Her skipper, Capt. G. Mastrominas, three other officers and one seaman remain aboard. Vessels of her type are valued at \$500,000 and her cargo is worth \$630,000.

Pacific Northwest Stays Hot Today

Excommunication Of Reds Touches Off Reaction In Soviet Presses Of Europe

ROME, July 14 (AP)—The pope's excommunication of communists is stirring the communist-controlled press of Europe to violent reaction today.

The Vatican disclosed last night that Pope Pius XII has cut off from the sacraments and comforts of the faith all Roman Catholics "who make profession of the materialistic and anti-Christian doctrine of the communists."

The action was a stern warning that the church will not compromise with communism.

It Paese, communist-line newspaper in Rome, called the decree "an act of hatred" and the official Italian communist newspaper, *L'Unita*, said the order "crowns a violent propagandistic campaign of the Holy See against Catholics who do not intend to submit to its political directives."

Italy is an overwhelmingly Catholic country in which the communists officially number more than 2,600,000, and the papal decree could have a telling effect here.

The communists have swung 5,000,000 votes in the postwar elections in France, also a predominantly Catholic country, where the warning of the pope to the faithful to avoid exposing themselves to communist doctrines and writings, also could have a heavy effect.

The concern the communists apparently feel in France is reflected in the official French communist newspaper, *L'Humanite*. In an angry attack on the Vatican, the newspaper termed the decree "pure totalitarianism."

The decree, announced by the sacred congregation of the holy office—which is in charge of protecting the faith—and approved by the pontiff—is interpreted by informed Vatican sources to be a last warning

to Catholics who may be leaning toward communism.

The decree marks the fourth time the pope has used excommunication to fight back at the communists in recent years.

Previous decrees had been directed at those who tried and sentenced Archbishop Alojzije Stepinac in Yugoslavia in 1946, at those responsible for the imprisonment of Hungary's Josef Cardinal Mindszenty, and at the founders and willing members of a separatist, government-controlled Catholic Action society in Czechoslovakia.

Canadians Cop Honors At Calgary

CALGARY, Alta., July 14 (AP)—Attendance marks continued to topple as the Calgary stampeede entered its fourth day with cool-nerved Canadian cowboys leading the dangerous steer decorating event.

For the third straight day yesterday, huge crowds jamming their way into Calgary's Victoria park set a new attendance mark. Official attendance yesterday was announced at 72,307, an increase of 8732 over the same date last year.

A trio of daring Canadian cowboys smashed the strangehold of United States rodeo stars on a major cowboy event by making a clean sweep of the steer decorating competition, rated one of the most dangerous of all rodeo activities.

Veteran Merle Sorenson of Ma-

grath, Alta., made a sensational leap onto the horns of a charging Texas longhorn to slip his ribbon in place in 3 3/8 seconds, just two-fifths of a second short of stampeede record time.

Sorenson's time gave him top honors in the first go-round of the decorating competition.

American cowpunchers held their grip on other events. Ross Dollarhide of Lakeview, Ore., took first go-round honors in the North American bucking horse championship with saddle. Eddie Akridge of Beaver, Okla., led in the bull riding event and shared the bareback bucking horse riding lead with another U. S. cowpoke, Buck Wyatt of Omaha, Neb.

SYMPATHY

ROME, July 14 (AP)—The communist controlled Italian confederation of labor today messaged striking London dockworkers that no Canadian ships would be unloaded in Italian ports. The message expressed "fraternal sympathy" for London strikers, the Italian news agency Astra said.
