

Beavers Drub Cellaring Angels, 7-3

Suds Snap Losing Streak With 6-1 Win Over Seals

The Beavers, playing for the first time without Jo Jo White at the helm, broke a nine game losing streak with a 6 to 1 win over San Francisco.

White resigned Wednesday as a climax to the disastrous losing streak. Coach Bill Lawrence was named manager for the time being.

In other Wednesday night Pacific Coast league play, second-place Sacramento knocked off the league-leading Hollywoods 2 to 1 in a tenning go; Oakland walloped San Diego 10 to 3 and Portland showed Los Angeles deeper in the cellar with a 7 to 3 drubbing.

It was Jim Tabor's single in the last half of the tenth that scooped Joe Grave with the winning run at Sacramento. Manuel Salvo, who took over in the ninth, got credit for the win.

The Oaks got to three San Diego pitchers for 15 hits. Gordon Goldsberry battle in four of the Oaks' runs as did Pitcher Rex Cecil. Cecil, who relieved in the third, set the F's down with two hits from then on.

The Los Angeles-Portland scrap was a vengeance act for Beaver Pitcher Red Lynn. The ex-angel beat Booker McDaniels in a tenning game that saw the Portland club explode for four runs in the finale. The Angels' Negro pitcher hurled eight-hit ball in losing.

More Farm Hands Than Jobs, Now. SALEM, July 14 (AP)—There are more farm hands than jobs in Oregon agriculture for the first time in eight years.

The state unemployment compensation commission said a slump in lumbering and influx of students into the job hunting population of the state had boosted unemployment to 42,000 early in July.

The total compared with 39,600 listed by the employment office rolls the month previous and 30,500 a year ago.

GEMS BLANK CATS Gilson Tosses Shutout Ball

Klamath Falls and Pittsburg picked up their mad scramble for the Far West baseball league's pennant last night, both scoring decisive victories.

The Gems, after breaking an eight-game winning streak Monday, bounced back to give the Santa Rosa Cats an 11-0 polishing in the first game of a series played in the California city. Pittsburg leveled on the Redding Browns for a 9-3 win.

The Gems still lead Pittsburg by a game and a half and both clubs gained ground on Willows, the third-place outfit. The Cardinals lost to Vallejo 8-1. In the league's other game, the fast-rising Marysville Braves outscored the Medford Nuggets 12-10.

Right-hander Stan Gilson spaced 10 hits in winning his seventh game for the Gems, who played errorless ball behind him. The game marked the fourth time this season Klamath Falls has been involved in a shutout, winning three of them and being blanked only by Medford early in the year.

Journalist: Russian Style

BERLIN (AP)—The "people's democracy" in the Soviet zone of Germany is creating a new type of journalist—the "people's correspondent." He is usually a worker who reports from his work or his factory to communist-controlled dailies.

Their stories are featured in large communist papers in East Berlin. Several columns are reserved for them.

Not all Russian-licensed newspapers like the new type of journalist. Said "Neue Zeit," a Christian-democratic organ: "The people's correspondents will hardly be in a position to satisfy the qualitative demands of the press."

But "Neue Zeit" was slapped back by "Neue Deutschland," the official Socialist Unity (communist) Party daily which criticized "the professional correspondents of those newspapers which do not know their direct contact with the essence of our social being."
