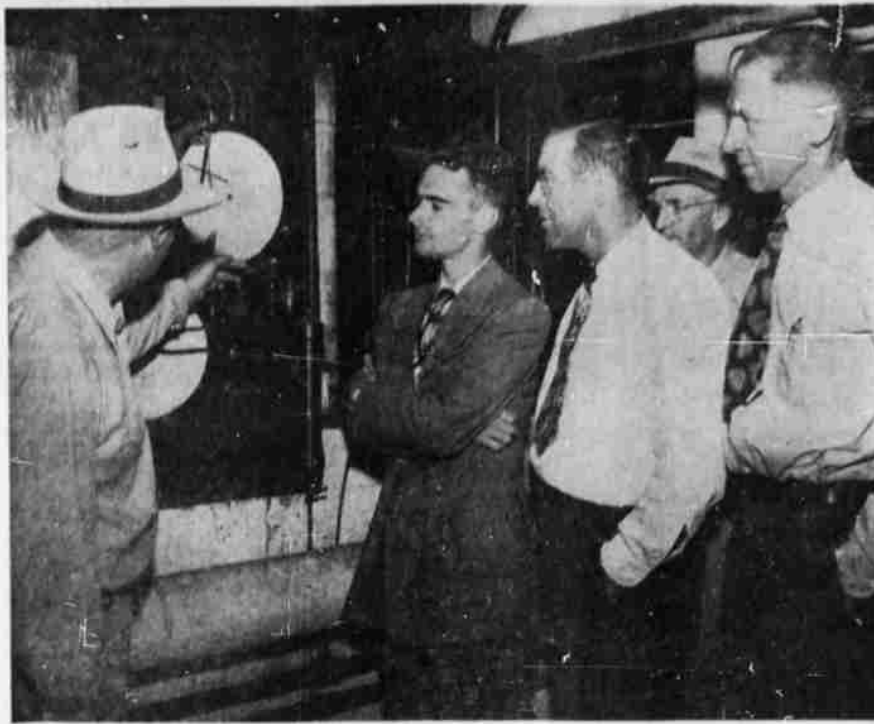

## Chamber Group Sees How It's Done At Pine Mill

 Progress of pine, fir and cedar logs hauled from Beiter, Calif., to the mill pond of Klamath Basin Pine Mills was followed from the pond through the mill by members of the chamber of commerce industrial tour Tuesday.

The visitors saw logs hooked from the pond, sent through the cutting room on through grading into the drying kiln and storerooms, to railroad cars for shipping.

Some of the lumber was routed to the planing mill and box factory where it was trimmed to size to be shipped as knock-down boxes to be assembled at destination.

From the time the lumber goes into the huge drying kiln to the time it is shipped it doesn't see daylight. The warm treatment in half-light prevents its warping and checking. Twenty-four hours in the dry room is required for every quarter-inch thickness of board.

What impressed visitors most on the tour was the smooth efficiency of operation throughout, each employee seeming to take an interest in his job and doing it without loss of time or effort, fitting it into the whole operation like a jigsaw puzzle piece.

Throughout the whole plant there were no loose boards or equipment lying around where it would cause accidents, no unsightly debris any-

where. Most of the work was done by machinery and the men who operated it had to keep eyes and mind on the job to keep the work moving and not lose the rhythm.

There are around 225 employees on the payroll now, 125 of them in the box and planing mill.

Floyd C. Ranker, lumber superintendent, and Wilbur Kesterson showed the group around.
