New Voting Precincts To Be Formed

Three new voting precincts are being formed in the populous south-east suburban area.

County Clerk Charlie DeLap said work is now under way in his office transferring voter registrations into the new districts. The three precincts will be known as Canal, Shasta and East Homedale.

Canal precinct will be bounded by Shasta way, the canal and Washburn way and is a portion of the old West Shasta precinct. It includes the federal housing unit.

The new Shasta precinct is taken off the western end of East Shasta and is bounded by Gary, Shasta way, Wiard and S. 4th.

East Homedale precinct will include the eastern portion of the old North Homedale precinct and two blocks of the old Pine Grove precinct and is bounded by Wiard, Patterson, S. 6th and the railroad tracks.

All three will be fairly high in registration.

Klamath county, with these changes, will have 78 voting areas, 48 of them outside the Klamath Falls city limits.

Operation Mudhole May Aid Game

MINNEAPOLIS, July 14 (AP)—A bombing mission to make mudholes was completed yesterday by a dozen navy planes.

The planes, from the naval air

station here, dropped 1000 and 800-pound bombs on a portion of Thered lake game refuge in northern Minnesota.

It is hoped by the state conservation department, which suggested the mission, that the bomb craters will become mus holes—a refuge for deer and moose pestered by insects.

Nine craters, some about 100 feet across, were made by the bombs.

State Road Crews Near Work Finish

Repairing of state roads damaged by the severe winter in this district is near completion, and the state highway department will set down to routine duties by the end of July, District Maintenance Superintendent Tom Edwards said today.

State road work, under the supervision of Edwards, totals 440 miles, covering highway 99 north to Crescent, west on the Willamette pass to the Southern Pacific overpass, east on the Klamath Falls-Lakeview highway to a point 10 miles east of Lakeview, and the Greensprings to a short distance this side of Weyerhaeuser.

Edwards said that the surface breakage was not as great as a year ago but the prime trouble this year was fixing of holes that went deeper into the roadbed.

Just tag ends of repair work remain, Edwards said, and should be finished by the end of July.

Crews then will go to work on routine ditch cleaning, brush-cutting, painting of road signs and other duties.

Committee To Look Over Hanford Plant

SPOKANE, July 14 (AP)—The committee of the atomic energy commission will visit the Hanford Works at Richland on a routine inspection trip Tuesday, Rep. Henry Jackson (D-Wash.) said today.

They are the general advisory committee, headed by one of the nation's top physicists, Dr. J. Robert Oppenheimer, and the military liaison committee, headed by William Webster of Washington, D. C.

Other members of the advisory committee scheduled to make the trip are Dr. James B. Conant, president of Harvard university; Hartley Rowe of Boston, vice president of the United Fruit company, and Oliver E. Buckley of New York, president of the Bell Telephone company.

An earlier group of visitors, several high-ranking officers of the sixth army, arrived at Richland from San Francisco yesterday. Their visit also was described as a "routine survey."

It was reported earlier the army will take over the job of policing the government reservation, but officials of the project have refused to comment on the probable starting date.

HONG KONG, July 14 (AP)—British registered vessel Kwei Wah, a river steamer, and looted its arsenal and most of its cargo, the ship reported today.

The pirates forced the steamer to go to an isolated spot where 70 more pirates helped them with their loot. The steamer's captain and eight passengers were held as hostages. The ship returned to Canton.

Meanwhile Chinese reports said 2000 troops had attacked pirates in the Mirs bay area in an attempt to clean it out. Fighting was expected to last a week there.
