

### Reds Clear Army Truck Convoy Today

HELMSTEDT, Germany, July 14 (AP)—Russian guards cleared a 60-truck American convoy through the Soviet zone checkpoint here in less than a minute today, lowering another bar in their "little blockade."

Last night the Russian guards suddenly relaxed their slowdown and gave the green light to German trucks bound for Berlin, permitting the vehicles to pass this checkpoint at a normal rate for the first time since Saturday.

The barriers were reported still up, however, at nine other Soviet zone entry points.

The Russian lieutenant at the Helmstedt checkpoint barely glanced at the U. S. travel orders for this morning's convoy, which was carrying supplies for the U. S. military post in Berlin.

Dropping their harassment of Berlin-bound German cargoes as mysteriously as they began on Saturday night, the Russians were clearing trucks through Helmstedt at the rate of 40 an hour today.

There was a backlog of only 80 German trucks awaiting entry when the American convoy passed through. Five hundred had been stalled yesterday.

Cargoes of perishable foodstuffs from West Germany were given priority and admitted to the Soviet zone during the night.

### Air Officers Hold Meet

Several items were brought up in the weekly meeting of the Klamath group of the volunteer air force train unit held last night in the basement room of the Hall hotel.

Foremost of subjects discussed was the point program for reserve officer retirement. Formation of a treasury for the group was also decided upon.

The group has been meeting for more than a year, and has not yet gained the representation of the eligible Klamath reserve officers it would like to have. According to unit records, there are about 140 reserve air force officers in this area today.

Meetings are held the first and third Wednesday nights at the Hall hotel. Meeting time is 8 p. m.

### Electrolytic Refinery Planned

GARFIELD, Utah (AP)—Kennecott Copper corporation is building a \$16,000,000 electrolytic refinery near Garfield. It is to be completed in 1950. The project includes hundreds of lead-lined concrete cells in which copper will be suspended in acid solution to produce pure commercial copper.

LOS ANGELES, July 14 (AP)—John D. Oppenheimer, 24, who had a little police trouble last November, parked his car in front of city hall all decked out with cards.

### Federal Jury Charges Pair

PORTLAND, July 14—A federal grand jury has returned indictments against two Klamath Indians.

Raymond (Skippy) Smith, 18, was indicted for second degree murder

in the death June 2 of Elmo Robert, 22, as the result of a knife fight at Pine Ridge on the Klamath reservation.

Smith is accused of wielding the knife.

The other indictment, for felonious assault, names Vernon Foster as the assailant of Frank Godowa, 57, three weeks ago at Psiute camp. Godowa was stabbed in the back and the injury resulted in temporary paralysis.
