Davis Heads Rent Office In Klamath

Rental knots are being untied in the Klamath Falls area rent office by Albert W. Davis, whose main office is in Medford. Davis replaces Ray Cook in this position.

Davis' title is landlord-tenant consultant, a new position created recently by congressional action.

Davis, who straightens out rental complaints from both landlords and tenants, has been working on this program for four years in Jackson and Klamath counties. He has been affiliated in real estate circles since 1920.

As long as housing facilities doesn't adequately meet the demand, this office will be necessary, Davis said.

Davis is urging landlords here to file petitions and register complaints so that rental problems can be handled.

"I am eager to help both landlords and tenants in any way I can, but they must make known their troubles," Davis said.

Geneva Hitson has been rent legal examiner in the local office, 432 Main, for one year.

To date, rent controls have not been lifted in either Klamath or Jackson counties, although ceilings have been removed in some Oregon counties.

350 Bills Effective Saturday

SALEM, July 15 (AP)—More than 350 bills of the 1949 legislature will become law tomorrow.

The legislature passed 590 measures, but the others already are effective because they contained emergency clauses.

Here are the more important new laws:

- Creating the office of state milk marketing administrator, to be named by the board of agriculture.
- A fair employment practices act.
- Increased industrial accident benefits.
- Licensing of practical nurses.
- The staggered plan of issuing automobile licenses.
- Preventing candidates for office from changing parties just before elections.
- Letting banks close on Saturdays.
- Requiring automobiles to stop for school buses which are loading or unloading.

20 Million Missing In Will Fight

LOS ANGELES, July 15 (AP)—A small matter of \$20,000,000 is all that seems to be missing in the battle over the will of late British Theatre Magnate Charles F. Bernhard.

His estranged widow, Jane Anne Liddell Bernhard, 71, told the court yesterday that she has been able to find only \$1100 in cash and a \$1000 automobile since Bernhard died here last June 10.

"We have been informed Bernhard sold his theatre interests in England for \$20,000,000," said her attorney, Gerald Lipsky.

Attorney for the estate, Louis M. Brown, said that so far no other assets have been discovered.

Arriving drivers said they had been halted briefly at Michendorf, 10 miles from Berlin, by a new Russian checkpoint.

East German police, under Russian military supervision, demanded all West marks in the drivers' possession.

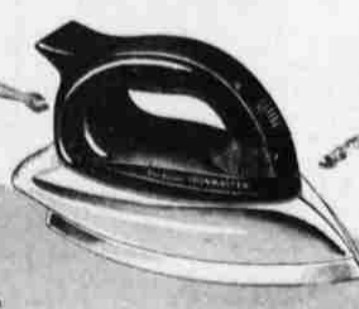
