Pole Sitting Protests Lack Of Apartment

REVERE, Mass., July 16 (AP)—The wife of a stevedock began her third day atop a 50-foot telegraph pole today in an effort to draw an offer of an apartment.

Mrs. Jean Ellis, 24, took up residence Thursday in a tarpaulin-covered platform on the pole top.

She said she will stay there until the stunt brings an offer of a suitable home for her, her husband and four-year-old daughter.

Tacked to the pole is a sign saying: "I am protesting the housing shortage."

Her husband, Arthur, 36, says high rentals have made it impossible for the family to find the kind of an apartment they want.

He constructed the 10 by 12 foot platform braced by guy wires against breezes of the Atlantic in this resort community known as the Coney Island of New England.

The platform is on the beach boulevard in full view of thousands who visit the resort daily.

Ellis climbs through the hinged trap door three times daily to bring food to his wife. He is living in a hotel and their daughter is living in a private home.

Chinese Reds Censor News, Cause Delay

SHANGHAI, July 16 (AP)—The communist military control commission today listed censorship regulations for outgoing news dispatches during the "military period." Another communist agency announced new travel rules for foreigners.

Censorship has been in effect several days.

The regulations specify that dispatches should not directly or indirectly report weather conditions, targets, damage or casualties of Chinese nationalists; bombings and strafings; other security information and the location of communist headquarters and billets.

Offending words will be struck out, the commission said; repeated violators will be "appropriately punished."

Correspondents have not complained about censorship. So far it has been fair and concerned only with military security. However, there have been many complaints about delays.

Dispatches have been held up from two to 30 hours.

Meanwhile, Shanghai's security bureau announced regulations governing travel by foreigners in communist China.

Heretofore, foreigners have not been permitted to leave the city. Those in Nanking and other communist cities have been allowed to travel, within limitations.

Travel time out of Shanghai will be limited to two weeks except in unusual cases. Only two points can be visited on a single trip without special permission.

Permits to leave China now are being issued — but there are no means of getting out.

Tavern Owner Fined \$150 On Minor Charge

Charles Lindsay, operator of Tina's tavern, and his barmaid, Grace Darling Sharp, were fined \$150 each by Justice of the Peace Joe Mahoney Saturday morning on a misdemeanor charge of selling beer to minors.

Justice Mahoney also stipulated a 30-day suspended jail sentence on both the offenders who were found guilty this week of selling beer at the Merrill-Lakeview junction tavern to three Klamath Union high school teen-agers the night and morning of May 13-14.

Miss Sharp, who was on duty back of the bar, was pointed out by 17-year-old Tom Abner, KUHS footballer, as the barmaid who sold three glasses of draft beer apiece to the three high school boys the night in question.

Lindsay and Miss Sharp were represented by Attorney Harry Bolvin, former member of the state liquor commission.

The tavern owner also faces the possibility of losing his liquor license if the case is reviewed by the state liquor commission.

Immigrant Finds He Has Spouse

COQUILLE, July 16 (AP)—Gene Bifano, an Italian immigrant, was suing today to divorce a wife he thought had died 23 years ago.

The Bandon resident said in a circuit court suit that he came to this country in 1921, and later sent for his wife to join him. She refused, he said, and her relatives notified him in 1926 that she had died.

Bifano said he had believed that until the Italian consul at Portland suddenly notified him that his wife had asked for support money.

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Shadduck Held For Navy Return

An 18-year-old Klamath Falls sailor is being held in the county jail for naval authorities. He is John Shadduck, 2452 Applegate, who is charged with being absent without leave from the San Diego naval training station.

Shadduck was picked up in Chilquin Friday by Chief of Police Archie Huff.

Naval records from San Diego show that Shadduck was given a 21-day leave June 2 but had not returned to the base.

Malin Plunge Opened Today

MALIN, July 16 — The Malin swimming pool opened this afternoon and will remain open until 9 p.m. for adults.

The summer swim schedule starting Monday is for children's instruction classes in the mornings from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. with the pool open at 2:15 p.m. to 9 p.m. daily for adults.

Merrill children will have the pool for classes Monday, Wednesday and Friday mornings and Tuesday and Saturday mornings. Main youngsters may swim any week-day afternoon. Children should bring suits, towels and 10 cents in coin.

Minimum fees are charged for swimming with high school students paying 20 cents, grade school pupils 15 cents, and adults 40 cents. These fees include tax.

Picnic tables are available for those who wish to bring lunches and enjoy the park after the swim.

Malin children who wish swimming instruction should register at the pool Monday.
