

Supreme Court Justice Murphy First Prominent As Governor Of Michigan

Supreme Court Justice Frank Murphy, whose death occurred today, first came into the limelight as governor of Michigan. That was in the 1930's when the first big sit-down strikes occurred. He was vigorously attacked by some for not using force to oust the sit-downers from automobile plants.

Murphy said that if the people of Michigan wanted their governor "to shoot the workers out of the factories and thus end sit-down strikes once and for all," they would have to get another governor to do it.

"If the American workmen are wrong," he declared, "I believe they can be taught the right way without writing the lesson in blood." (He said later that he believed sit-down strikes were wrong.)

During the strike crisis President Franklin D. Roosevelt described him as "a profoundly religious, able and law-abiding governor."

Governor Murphy was defeated for reelection.

As mayor of Detroit at the depth of the economic depression of the early '30's, Murphy asserted that a

Fire Rips Businesses In Longview

LONGVIEW, July 19 (AP)—A fire described as the most costly in Longview's 25-year history caused a loss last night estimated at more than \$200,000.

The fire broke out shortly before 10 p. m. in a back portion of the Helen Davis, Inc., store in the main part of the business district. Before it was controlled an hour and a half later the blaze had gutted the interior of the store.

The adjoining store of Judd's, Inc., suffered a complete loss also, according to an early morning examination. Most of the damage in Judd's, which is a stationery and office supply store, was from smoke and water.

Two other stores in the same building also suffered heavy smoke and water damage. One was the Price Fur shop, the other the offices of Dr. H. L. Mahne, optometrist.

Firemen and insurance men gave the unofficial loss estimate.

The building housing the stores is owned by Val Quoidbach of Longview.

Cause of the blaze has not been determined. Firemen have one report it first was seen in a storeroom at the back of the Helen Davis store, which closed Monday for remodeling. It is one of a chain operated by Helen Davis of Tacoma.

The adjoining appliance store of the Korten company was seriously threatened, and the Commercial hotel building across the alley from Korten's also was periled while the flames shot high from the Helen Davis structure.

Kelso and Long-Bell Lumber company firemen aided in the fire-fighting operation.

Burning Permits Save Trouble

The suburban fire department reports that many fire calls in the suburban area of Klamath Falls are to small fires being controlled by residents burning weeds and other debris without first obtaining a permit.

According to Fire Chief Buster Gordon, the Klamath Forest Protective association reports many of the trash fires in the area, and that many runs by the suburban fire truck would be eliminated if permits had first been taken out.
