Here's Why The Russians Kept Secret All Inventions

MOSCOW, July 20 (AP)—Why are the Russians just beginning to assume credit for inventing everything from the steam engine to the airplane?

Because the czars concealed the facts to please foreign capitalists, says the Soviet newspaper Trud, organ of the trade unions.

Recent Soviet announcements

that great discoveries and inventions previously credited to westerners were actually made by Russians will encourage Soviet patriotism and discredit the regime that concealed them, the paper said.

Further, said Trud, they will combat the "repulsive disease" of "sympathy before bourgeois culture."

"Sympathy" is defined by Funk and Wagnall's dictionary as "base flattery."

Trud charged that Russian landowners and capitalists wanted to help western capitalists encourage the view that Russia was a backward country which must remain dependent on Western Europe. Therefore, says the paper, they suppressed news of scientific advances in Russia.

Now, Trud declared, a list of these inventions has become an effective means of combating "cosmopolitanism" and theories of "Anglo-Saxon superiority," which the paper called dangerous weapons of Anglo-American warmongers.

Movies Shown On New Dope For Potatoes

MERRILL, July 20—Frank Durbin, a representative of the Shell Chemical corporation of Pittsburg, Calif., was present at a meeting of interested farmers held Monday evening in the recreation hall.

Durbin showed movies of the equipment used and the results of application of NH3 (agricultural ammonia) to potato crops. NH3 is 82 per cent nitrogen and is now being metered into irrigation water on potato fields needing nitrogen, especially those that were nipped by the recent frost.

Agricultural ammonia has been used extensively in California and western Arizona for the past 14 years, but is entirely new in this area. It is a product of the Shell Chemical corporation's factory at Pittsburg. Glenn Barton and Cal Freeland from the plant at Pittsburg have been sent here to assist in making applications of the chemical locally.

Bob Walker, local distributor, made arrangements for Durbin's visit.

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Tuna Appear Off Coast Of Canada

VICTORIA, B. C., July 20 (CP)—The tuna have arrived off the coast of British Columbia.

But, according to fisheries officials, there will be no immediate stampede of fishermen to catch the valuable "chicken of the sea."

Capt. Walter Redford of the fisheries vessel Howay reported that a tuna was caught Monday, 40 miles southwest of Cape Cook, the northern tip of Vancouver island in water with a temperature of 58.6 degrees.

This morning, the Howay landed

two tuna 91 miles southwest of Es-tevan point in water which was 59 degrees. Captain Redford said the water was "a good blue."

Monday's catch by the Howay was the first tuna of the year in Canadian waters. Last year, first tuna was caught 10 days earlier and a large school was located.

The investigations by the Howay and her sister ship, The Laurier, now tied up here, show only a trend, and no sign of a large school.
