## Wheat Climbs Higher Today

CHICAGO, July 20 (AP)—Wheat climbed higher on the board today, aided by trade reports of an increase in flour business. The bread cereal met only a small amount of hedging pressure as it climbed upward. All contracts went above \$2.00.

Biggest gains, however, were made in soybeans. Spurring several cents, all deferred bean contracts met new highs since trading in them started.

Wheat closed 1 1/4-1 1/2 higher, July \$2.00-1/4, corn was 1/4 lower to 1 cent higher, July \$1.42-1/4, oats were 1/2-2/4 higher, July 66-66 1/2, rye was 1 1/4-1 1/2 higher, July \$1.55, soybeans were 4 1/2-6 1/2 higher, July \$2.65-2.66, and lard was 10 cents lower to 17 cents a hundred pounds higher, July \$11.35.

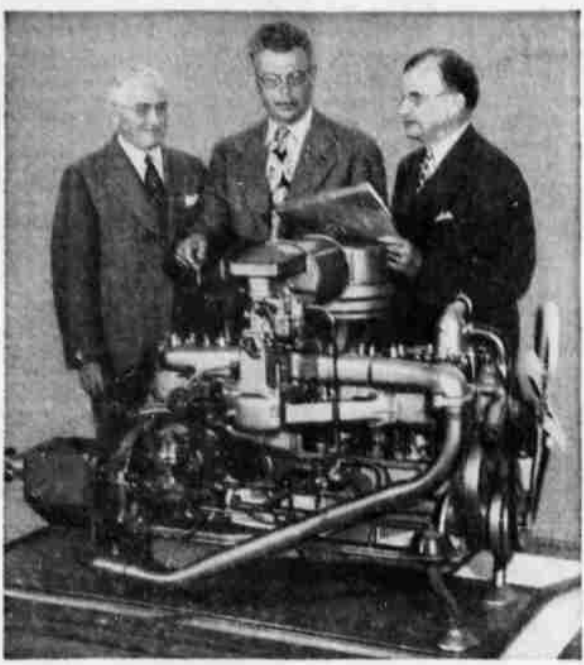

## Stocks Score Fresh Gains

NEW YORK, July 20 (AP)—The stock market scored fresh gains today under leadership of steel and railway issues.

In active trading leading issues moved up fractions to around a point.

The latest rise put the general level of prices at a new eight-week high. A rally has been under way ever since mid-June.

Business was swollen by unusual activity in two low-priced utility shares, Commonwealth & Southern and United Corp., but even without these two issues trade was larger than usual.

Turnover hit a rate of around 1,400,000 shares for the full session. C & S, in which trading was spectacularly large yesterday, was still very much in evidence. One block of 115,000 shares sold at 4 1/2, equal to the year's high, but the stock had trouble maintaining the increase. United Corp. in smaller but still impressive volume, rose at one time 14 to 3 1/2, tops for 1949.

Also heard were U. S. Steel, Bethlehem, General Motors, Chrysler, Goodrich, Montgomery Ward, Admiral Corp., Southern California Edison, Owens-Illinois, American Woolen and Richfield Oil.

Among the sticky spots were U. S. Rubber, Sears Roebuck, Douglas Aircraft, Western Union and American Tobacco.

## Little Frost Damage Seen Over Basin

Frost touched the Klamath basin lightly Tuesday night in scattered areas but little damage as far as could be determined by noon Wednesday.

Farmers scanned barometers anxiously Tuesday and took all precautions possible. Some stayed up all night checking conditions. Some men started irrigating at an early hour to have the fields sufficiently damp to prevent damage if the mercury dropped, while others employed pilots to fly for frost.

Local temperatures hovered around 40 degrees at the minimum and it was about that warm around Hentley which the frost bypassed. Frost was reported as general but light through the valley and Tulelake and Coppack bay. No resultant damage to crops from the low basin temperatures has been reported, although there was talk that the mercury dropped as low as 28 degrees in outlying areas of Tulelake.

Weather forecasters gave a prediction of partly cloudy for tonight and Thursday with showers Thursday with a low of 38-42 expected for tonight.

Forest service information gave scattered clouds for tonight's forecast and fair with scattered clouds Thursday, clearing with rising temperatures for Friday.
