Draft Boards To Be Merged

PORTLAND, July 21 (AP)—Merger of most of Oregon's selective service boards will result from a 40 per cent budget cut.

Col. Francis W. Mason, deputy selective service director, said personnel and office hours also would be reduced. The budget was cut from \$207,000 to \$90,000.

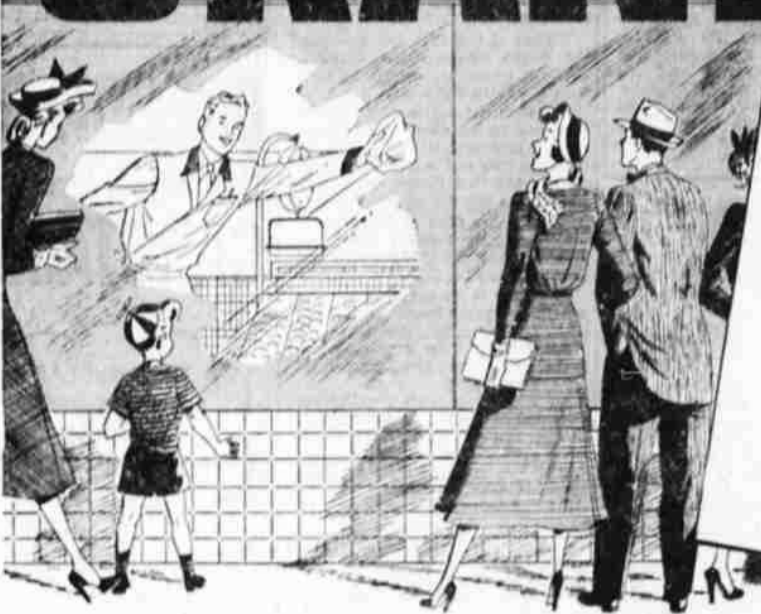
Columbia, Washington and Clackamas boards will be grouped with the Multnomah boards; Linn county merged with the Benton county board; Polk merged with the Marion county board; Coos and Curry merged with the Douglas county board; Josephine with the Jackson county board; and Union, Wallowa and Malheur counties merged with Baker county board.
