## Truman Mum On Murphy Successor

WASHINGTON, July 21 (AP)—President Truman said today he will name a successor to the late Supreme Court Justice Frank Murphy as soon as possible. But he declined to give any hint as to who might receive the post.

He replied with a terse no comment when asked if the new justice would be a Roman Catholic. Murphy was the only member of that faith on the nation's highest tribunal.

Mr. Truman said that practically every federal judge in the country has been endorsed by someone for the appointment.

Probably all of them are qualified, he added.

## Johnson Says Alaska Defense Plans Ready

WASHINGTON, July 21 (AP)—Secretary of Defense Johnson assured Senators today that adequate plans for defending Alaska are in operation but he asked to tell about them at a secret session.

Johnson appeared before the senate armed services committee to urge quick approval of \$643,000,000 worth of construction projects for the army, navy and air forces. The work would be done both in this country and overseas.

He said these represent the "most strategically and critically necessary public works projects," including buildings for defense installations and special research.

Senator Knowland, (R-Calif.) raised questions about the Alaskan defenses. Numerous other congressmen recently have been questioning means for protecting this point of United States territory nearest Russia and Asia.

Knowland wanted to know if defense officials had "taken all necessary precautions" for Alaska. Johnson said they had but added he wanted to answer detailed questions behind doors with reporters and witnesses excluded.
