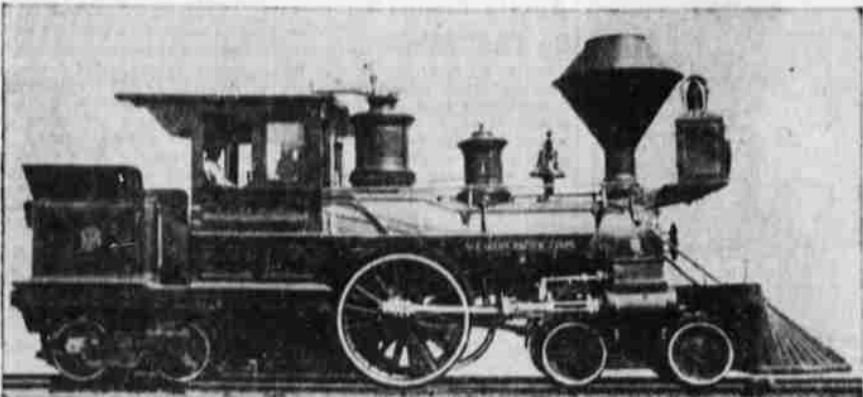
They are also being used between San Francisco and Salt Lake.

Hot Weather Grips South

CHICAGO, July 21 (AP)—Another day of hot, humid weather appeared in prospect today for most of the southern and east-central states.

Some parts of the hot belt got a measure of relief from thunder showers, but temperatures in the high 80's and 90's were forecast.

Meanwhile, cooler air spread into the northern plains states while temperatures over most of the midwest were around normal. The mercury hit above 100 in parts of Kansas, Nebraska and Texas yesterday.

Light rain fell in the central plains and Upper Mississippi valley today.

A severe rain-hail-electrical storm struck Southern New England last night after yesterday's 90 plus temperatures. Seven persons died in the storm, including two struck by lightning and four drownings. Damage from fire and high winds was heavy while the expensive Connecticut valley tobacco crop suffered severe damage.

PORTLAND, July 21 (AP)—Crop yield declines may be caused by a dwindling bee population.
