

Palica Posts Seventh; Bums Tip Pittsburgh

Brechen Hurts Five-Hitter To Trip Boston, 3-1

Erv Palica is hailed as "The New Casey" in Brooklyn where the hard-pressed Dodgers today open a vital four-game series with the St. Louis Cardinals.

Day after day Palica is waved from the bullpen to start the skin of a regular Brooklyn saved just like Hugh Casey used to do. Erv worked in seven of the last 11 Dodger games, winning four and losing one.

Ironically he capped his seventh victory of the season yesterday because Casey, the old Brooklyn fireman, now with Pittsburgh failed to stop a Dodger uprising. Luis Olmo, who may be the prize of the returning Mexican Jumpers, nipped Casey for a game-winning "pinch" single that supplied Brooklyn's 1-0 edge over the Pirates.

The Dodgers really needed that win over the Pirates because the Cardinal victory over Boston already was posted on the scoreboard in right center field. Now with a 2 1/2 game lead, they can't lose first place unless they blow it the whole series.

BRECHEN WINS
Harry Brechen lifted the Cards over Boston, 3-1 with a five-hitter while the Birds handed Johnny Antonelli, the Braves \$70,000 bonus dandy, his fifth loss.

Bobby Thomson led the New York Giants to their fourth straight win, three in a row over Cincinnati, with a pair of homers and a double. The Scot from Staten Island drove in six runs off Herman Wehmeier, Ed Ewart and Ewell Blackwell in the Giants' 9-5 triumph.

Walker Cooper, making his first appearance in the Polo Grounds since he was sold to Cincinnati, homered with the bases loaded as the Reds routed Cincinnati in a five-run third inning.

THANK BOWERS
The New York Yankees took the rubber game of the Cleveland series, 5-3, stretching their American League lead to 5 1/2 games on Vic Raschi's 15th victory.

Raschi, who has lost only three, scattered eight hits. It was the fourth straight time he had lamed the tribe who have yet to beat him. Once again Joe DiMaggio was the big man, driving in two runs with a single that sparked a three-run rally against loser Early Wynn in the third.

SIEVERS HOMERS
With Roy Sievers hitting a grand slam homer, the St. Louis Browns scored 11 runs in the sixth inning of their 15-2 twilight decision over Philadelphia's Dick Fowler. They were noted out in the second game, 3-2, on Hank Majeski's game-winning triple in the eighth inning as Alex Kalina registered win No. 13.

FOURTEEN men went to bat in the big inning, a new high scoring total for the season in an American league inning. Seven hits and five walks did the damage.

Detroit slammed out 14 hits, including homers by Pat Mullin, Dick Wakeland and George Vico, to whip Washington, 6-3. Freddie Hutchinson, relieving Ted Gray in the fourth, worked 5 1/3 scoreless innings for his sixth victory. Rae Scarborough was the losing pitcher.

THE Boston-Chicago game was rained out in the American league.

Let's Go Fishin'
PORTLAND, July 22 (AP)—Good fishing in several areas, particularly Klamath county and the McKenzie river, was reported by the state game commission today.

The weekly fishing bulletin: Deschutes area—Sparks lake excellent, but very few large fish taken. Paulina, East, and Crane Prairie lakes fair to good. Wickiup reservoir poor. Upper Deschutes and Little Deschutes rivers and Crescent creek just fair. Fishing best evenings.

Douglas county—Roseburg—Upper Umpqua area, water conditions generally good, occasionally some murkiness. Trout fishing good. Some steelhead being taken.

Klamath county—Crater lake fish in excellent condition but difficult to catch. Fisher lake—most experienced anglers taking limit catches daily. Most popular method is to troll with Ford fender and worms at a distance of from 50 to 75 feet behind the boat with no lead on the line. Boat fishing with single egg and worms is fair. There has been very little fly fishing. Four-Mile lake—approximately 40 per cent of the anglers taking their limit. Bass fishing close to the bottom with single egg or worms most successful.

The road has recently been repaired, but it is very dusty. Lake of the Woods—fishing success fair with the most popular gear being the "Lure Jensen" Ford fender trolled with worms. Early morning and late afternoon fishing best. Evening fly fishing good with fish averaging ten inches being taken. Brown hackle or similar type fly is the most popular.

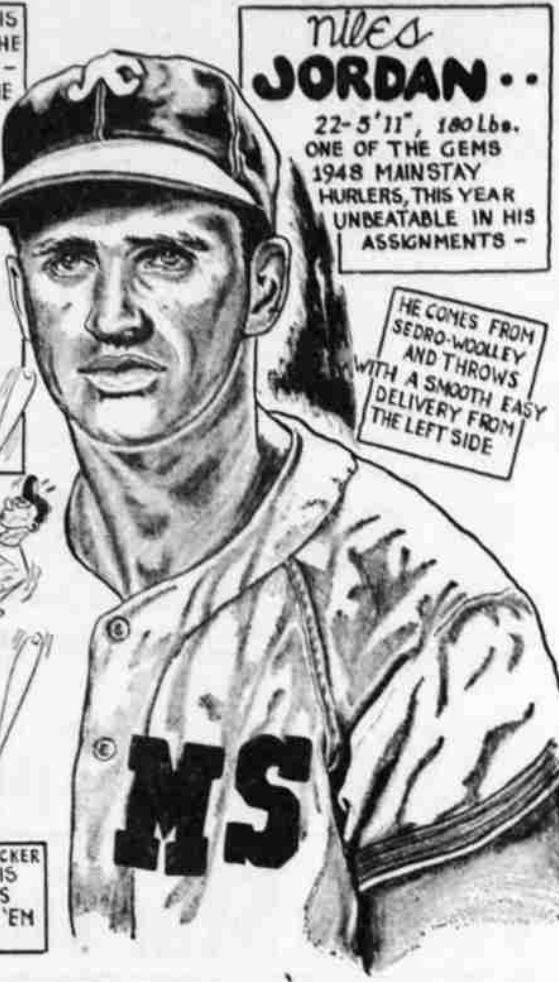

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Williams Lulls Bolanos For 4th Round TKO

Enrique's Manager Charges Ike With Thumbing Tactics
LOS ANGELES, July 22 (AP)—The championship dream of Mexico's Enrique Bolanos was shattered by a fourth round technical knockout from the furious fists of Deadpan Ike Williams but the result brought a quick charge of "fool" from the Latin's manager.

Bolanos went down and out before a fusillade of punches in the fourth round of their scheduled 15-round clash for the lightweight championship of the world last night. Some 18,000 spectators paid \$108,274 to see the fierce bout, promoted for the benefit of the Lou Costello Jr. Youth foundation. Williams weighed 135 pounds and Bolanos 133.

Early today, George Parnassus, manager of the defeated challenger, said his boy had been "thumbed" in the eye and thus blinded by Williams, a charge which the champion quickly denied.

Referee Jack Dempsey, likewise, said he didn't see any foul play with the thumb. But Parnassus said he would take his accusation before the California athletic commission in formal protest.

It is no secret that Bolanos' left eye trouble marked the beginning of the end. It started closing early in the third and was shut completely by the end of the round.

Parnassus said that Bolanos complained as early as the first round that Williams was giving him "the thumb." Parnassus protested to Dempsey in the third who relayed the protest to Williams.

Dr. R. J. Carreon Jr., an eye specialist who looked at the damaged orb after the fight, said the injury was serious. The damage that it would have to be kept under observation for at least 10 days to prevent permanent damage.

The doctor commented that the bruise on the eyeball would have been difficult to inflame with a gloved fist.

It was Enrique's third crack at the Trenton, N. J., Negro and his third defeat at the hands of the 25-year-old champion.

Champion Ike, appearing stronger and faster than in their previous matches, started winning at the opening bell. He had the end in sight at the close of the third canto when Bolanos' left eye was shut tighter than a miser's purse from jolting right smashes.

Bolanos got out for the fourth where he battled on even terms for the first minute. But then the sky fell on him.

A withering left hook to Enrique's chin dropped him to both knees. He was up at nine, but Williams, with rocking blows to the head and body, sent him to the canvas again.

Referee Dempsey and Bolanos' handlers halted the proceedings simultaneously with 20 seconds left in the round.

SEATTLE, July 22 (AP)—The awaited duel between Portland's Emery Neale and UCLA's Glen Bassett for the Washington state tennis championship won't be played. Neither one of the principals will be around.

Neale, seeded No. 1 in the state tourney, was eliminated yesterday by Jack Shoemaker, another UCLA freshman and sixth seeded in the Washington meet. Shoemaker dumped Neale 6-2, 6-4 to move into the semifinals.

Bassett, seeded No. 2, was eliminated by Fred Fisher, University of Washington student, 11-9, 6-4. Other results:

He paced Silverton in five innings after a six-run outburst in the fourth put the Marion county team far in front.

In the other games Garibaldi defeated Portland's Red Sox, 9 to 5, and Portland's Kool Spot edged Clackamas, 7 to 5.

Talent Search Heavyweight Contender Sought

LOS ANGELES, July 22 (AP)—Former Heavyweight Champion Jack Dempsey and Veteran Boxing Promoter Jack Allen of Toronto soon will begin scouring the broad miles of Canada, searching for heavyweight fighters.

Dempsey and Allen, the latter newly arrived here, conferred today on plans for an all-Canadian heavyweight boxing tournament which will be launched at Toronto September 19, according to present plans.

The object, of course, is to unearth a Canadian worthy of going after the world championship vacated by Joe Louis.

"We have about 30 prospects lined up now, and we expect to have between 60 and 100 young fighters in the tournament," Dempsey said.

Allen said the tournament will be staged in Toronto's Maple Leaf Gardens, with a seating capacity of 15,000 for boxing matches. Dempsey plans to be there several days in advance.

Dempsey advocated the idea during a recent visit in Winnipeg, where he was in the company of Allen, formerly of Vancouver, B. C., and Canada should produce a contender.

Allen plans to remain here several days and head for Vancouver. Dempsey said if any prospects look exceptionally good, a training camp may be set up in Canada, with older timer experts on hand to school the boxers.

Bevos Get Mound Doctor

PORTLAND, July 22 (AP)—It will be Dr. Frank Dierick, M.D., on the mound again for the Portland Beavers of the Pacific Coast baseball league—at home games.

The physician, who hurried previously for the Beavers and for Salem of the Western Intercollegiate league, has kept his pitching arm in shape while working at his medical practice in Oregon City the past year and a half.

He organized the semi-pro Oregon City Merchants and became the star pitcher in its league. In one recent game at McMinnville, he struck out 17 of the 21 men to face him.

Baseball has been his hobby since playing for Pacific university in his pre-med college days. He was due to check in at Seattle today, to be with the Portland team for the rest of the Seattle series. But he will not travel to other coast league cities.

Barely Miss Two Blanks

ROANOKE, Va., July 22 (AP)—A real baseball rarity—twinnish no-hitters—borely missed the record books in a class B Piedmont league doubleheader tonight.

Jack O'Fee of the Roanoke Red Sox baffled the Richmond Colts for six and two-thirds innings before a double robbed him of a no-hitter in the seven-frame opener.

But Southpaw Joe Reedy made the grade in the second contest. The 20-year-old Roanoke hurler, a native of Reading, Pa., muffled the Richmonders all the way as the Red Sox won, 3-0.

GEMS FACE BRAVES Pitt Stays Ahead Of Pack

Klamath Falls unleashed another fence-rattling attack on the Santa Rosa Cats last night, winning 17-10 in the best game of the series, but gained not an inch on the Pittsburg Diamonds who won their 10th straight Far West game and set a circuit record for continuous triumphs.

Santa Rosa did some attacking of its own, pounding Chuck Schillemeyer for 17 hits including three homers. The Gems collected 10 base blows off Hemo Petroto and in spite of the scoring the game was well played and fast.

The Cats were ahead briefly, holding a 3-2 lead in the third inning, but in the bottom of that frame Ralph Mohler singled with two runners aboard to put the Gems out front to stay.

Bob Cassell homered with two on in the fourth inning and Bill Reese hit our solo in the seventh. Bob Blengino hit one for the Cats in the first frame, Jerry Gale got his in the fifth and Jerry McDonnell hit the longest of the cluster in the ninth. McDonnell's clout sailed over

the 365-foot marker in right center. Reese was the only right-hander hitting the distance.

Gordon Hernanes toured the bases on a hit and earned the second straight night. In the seventh he tripled to the center wall and as he slowed down at third a relay from the outfield was batted and he raced home.

It was a hitter's night all the way. Morris Nordell, Reese and Hernandez each gathered four base knocks for the Gems. Gale had five for five for Santa Rosa. McDonnell and Petroto three for five each.

Unbeaten Blair Simpson gained his ninth win of the season as Pittsburg beat Redding 12-7. He out-pitched Redding's Junior Binnons.

The Marysville Braves, to open in Klamath Falls today, will arrive a four-game series, last night won for 9-5 and moved into a fifth-place tie with Santa Rosa. Vallejo salvaged the final game of its Willows series by defeating the Cardinals 5-1.
