Klamath Goes Over Top In Bond Drive

Klamath county topped its Opportunity Bond drive quota of \$358,000 in the recently closed sales effort. County Chairman Andrew M. Collier announced today.

Collier received notification from the Oregon bond headquarters that Klamath's cumulative sales were \$359,099, or just \$1099 over the quota. Klamath's sales were 100.3 per cent of quota.

The state as a whole oversubscribed the bond drive goal by 11 per cent.

Some other counties, with amount of sales and percentage of quota given in that order: Lake, \$64,835, 105 per cent; Jackson, \$270,475, 100.5 per cent; Douglas, \$228,009, 100.1 per cent; Deschutes, \$166,633, 100.6 per cent.

Only counties that failed to make quota were Marion, 88 per cent; Josephine, 66 per cent; and Multnomah, 79 per cent. Jefferson led the state with 173 per cent.

Collier voiced his thanks to all who helped in the drive and those who bought bonds.

Travel Tour For Editors Called Off

A tour of Oregon by travel editors of midwest and eastern newspapers, scheduled to start Wednesday morning, has been cancelled, according to Charles R. Stark, vice president for Oregon of Pacific Northwest Travel association, sponsors of the tour which has already covered parts of North Dakota, Montana, Wyoming, Idaho and Washington.

Physical exhaustion of the editors was given as the reason for cutting the trip short. The tour started July 10 from Chicago.

Oregon cities which were to have been visited are Portland, Astoria, Seaside, Tillamook, Newport, North Bend-Coos Bay, Grants Pass, Medford, Ashland, Klamath Falls, Bend, Springfield, Hood River, Salem and McMinnville. Plans to visit John Day, Baker, La Grande, Enterprise, Pendleton and possibly other communities had been given up earlier due to the long distances involved and the fact that the editors only had five days in which to cover Oregon.

It was planned to split the party into two groups so each editor would have covered only a part of the itinerary.

"Every effort will be made next year," Stark said, "to get the tour to originate in Oregon so the editors may see this part of the Northwest while they are fresh."

An increase of 15.32 per cent in the net income of the California Oregon Power company for the year ending June 30, 1949, over the net income of a year ago was disclosed today in the company's annual report.

Total net income for the fiscal year just ended was \$2,109,581, compared to \$1,829,254 for the 1947-48 fiscal year.

Net income for the first six months of this year amounted to \$1,059,414, an increase of 15.70 per cent over the same period in 1948.
