

Garden Show Plans Made

TULELAKE—Plans for the fall flower show to be sponsored by the garden group of the Klamath Library club are progressing rapidly, according to Mrs. Hugh O'Connor, general chairman.

Committees have been appointed for the show which is scheduled for Thursday, August 25, in the auditorium of Fremont school, and the schedule for exhibitors has been arranged.

Mrs. O'Connor's committee chairmen include Mrs. Leo Nils, publicity; Mrs. Fred Karlson, arrangements; Mrs. Earl Redman, president of the group, chairman of judges; Mrs. Joe Hicks, finance; Mrs. Will Wood, corsages; Mrs. Douglas Tennant, transportation; Mrs. G. D. Grizzle, scouting; Mrs. Dean Osborne, silver tea chairman; Mrs. George Houck and Mrs. Eric Majors, educational; Mr. and Mrs. Kenneth McLeod Jr., conservation; Mrs. H. S. Stone, junior division.

Theme of the show will be "World Unity Through Gardening." Specimen arrangements of annuals, perennials, flowers and shrubs will be given special classification as well as those listed here. Any person desiring a schedule may contact Mrs. Hugh O'Connor or Mrs. Fred Karlson.

The schedule is as follows: Arrangement Classes—1. World Neighbors—Table arrangements suggestive of some one country, (i.e., China, England, France, etc.). 2. Natural Phenomena—An arrangement of plant material to represent a phenomenon of nature (i.e., snow, wind, rain, lightning, rainbow, sunset, moonlight, etc.). 3. Earth's Treasures—An arrangement to suggest one of the natural resources of the world (i.e., coal, iron, tin, lead, etc.). Container and/or accessories must feature substance chosen. To be staged in lighted niche.

4. Birds of America—A study combining an Audubon print and a floral arrangement. 5. Japanese Influence—A line arrangement. 6. Classic Beauty—A mass arrangement in an urn, using fruits and/or vegetables to complete the composition. To be staged on a pedestal provided by the club. 7. Much From Little—A budget arrangement, including container, not to exceed \$2. Complete inventory of costs to accompany exhibit.

8. Jewels in Jazz—An imaginative still life composition including a jar of canned fruit or vegetables to suggest precious or semiprecious gem. The completed picture should express the idea of the intrinsic value of the food as well as its inherent beauty. 9. Outdoor Dining—Patio table arrangements. 10. A Green Job—Foliage arrangement. 11. Beauty and Permanence—Arrangement of dried materials. 12. Afternoon Tea—Arrangement in a cup and saucer. 13. Small Fry—Miniature arrangements under three inches. 14. Bottle Arrangements. 15. Basket Arrangements. 16. Gracious Gestures—Corsages. 17. Hospitality—Tray arrangements featuring fruits, vegetables, and/or flowers.

18. Junior Classes 1. Bird houses or bird feeding trays. 2. Posters advertising the fall flower show. 3. Collection of weeds—correctly labeled. 4. Animals or birds made from vegetables and/or fruits. 5. Miniature arrangements not over six inches high. In each of the first four junior classes: First prize, \$2; second prize, \$1. In class No. 5: First prize, \$1; second prize 75 cents.
