It is too readily assumed that all the troubles of European countries originated in World War II; that Europe was a sort of paradise until Hitler started his war, assisted by Stalin. Therefore, it is taken for granted that their weakness and disintegration followed rather than preceded the advent of the war.

While France did not suffer during the 1930's the extensive unemployment which occurred in other advanced industrial countries, her real national income fell sharply and never regained its 1929 peak.

Stagnant France FRANCE was once an investor's country. The French possessed a large reservoir of savings which poured a stream of capital not only into French commerce but into the industries of the world.

Stagnant France, with a constant birth rate and a productivity that decreased, was a menace to the peace of the world because it gave to a would-be world conqueror an invitation to attempt war.

Fort Klamath was established in 1863 and abandoned in 1880. It was set up as a protection to travelers through the then wild Klamath country.

Klamath agency was set up in the eighteen-sixties after the treaty of 1864 with the Klamath, Modoc and Yahookin tribe of Snake Indians.

THE GALLUP POLL Ex-Presidents In Senate Draw Approval

PRINCETON, N. J., July 25—The idea of having ex-presidents hold a permanent seat in the senate, so that the country could benefit by their experience, receives a good deal of support from voters in a national survey.

The ideal was proposed recently by Herbert Hoover, only living ex-president, and received favorable comment from a good many political commentators.

The survey by the American Institute of Public Opinion finds that voters with the most education are the most in favor of adopting the reform suggested.

Here is the national vote: "It has been suggested that when a president of the United States ends his term of office, he should be made a life-time member of the U. S. senate, taking an active part in the work of the senate although not having a vote on any bills. Do you think this is a good idea, or not?"

Yes 41% No 38% No opinion 21%

I also have seen a judge lean over and ask a witness a leading question which resulted in the conviction of the accused. The defense offered no objection.

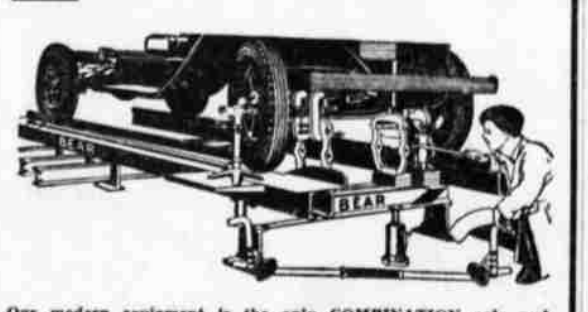
