Hunt Areas Closed Off

PORTLAND, July 25 (AP)—The new state game commission closed off some areas and curtailed the Baker area's long elk season as it established final hunting regulations for the year.

The commission considered the regulations at a meeting here Saturday.

Chairman Carl Hill also announced that Charles Lockwood, a former state game director until December 31, Lockwood later named Phil Schneider, a former director, as his assistant.

The changes in the tentative game regulations announced July 10 were:
1-Baker area: Elk season was shortened to close December 31 instead of January 21.

2-Douglas county, east of highway 99, will be closed for elk.
3-Myrtle creek game refuge in Harney county will be closed after being open the past several years.

4-Mountain sheep refuge in Wallowa county will be closed to all but waterfowl hunters.
5-Sherman county will be closed to deer hunting.
