

McNary Dam Pushed At Full Speed

McNARY, Ore., July 26 (AP)—Six months of concrete pouring at the site of McNary dam on the Columbia river has resulted in towering installations that are making the big project really look like a dam. Spillway bays, blockhouse walls and stilling basin structures on the Washington shore have been under way since January and are about 35 per cent complete.

Charles L. Morgan, construction chief for the contractors, said 1240 men are working in three shifts around the clock and under floodlights at night. The work force is at a peak for the work currently under way, he said.

Construction on the Oregon side of the river is expected to begin by mid-August. The army engineers have received bids on the work, a second major phase of the \$227,000,000 project.

If congress keeps appropriating funds at an average of \$40,000,000 a year, the engineer corps expect the dam—third hydroelectric project for the river—will be producing power by December, 1953.

Patients May Return To Hillside Soon

Patients evacuated from Hillside hospital Thursday afternoon following a roof fire at the building will be moved back this week, with the announcement that repairs at Hillside are going along at a fast clip.

Twenty-eight patients were moved to Klamath Valley hospital following the fire which was extinguished quickly, thus avoiding what could have been a major disaster.

Repair to the roof was finished over the week-end. The plastering is underway now and should be completed tomorrow. Painters will move in tomorrow, it was reported.

Although an exact figure on the damage is not available, reliable information has it that it will "not miss \$5000 very far," depending largely on the cost of the painting.

The patient-evacuation at Hillside marked the first time that such a move was necessary in Klamath Falls, although it was done as a precautionary measure rather than an emergency.

High Speeds Big Cause Of Car Deaths

Statewide records show that one in every six traffic accidents taking place at speeds between 60 and 70 miles an hour results in a fatality, Secretary of State Earl T. Newby has reported.

Above 70 miles an hour, almost every other accident causes a death. Between 30 and 40 miles an hour, an accident is fatal only once in 20 times.

These facts are revealed by annual statistics compiled from all accident reports filed with his office, Newby said, and show the effect of speed on the state's traffic death record. Since speeds are higher in summer when highways are carrying heavier loads, drivers must remember the slogan "speed kills—take it easy", the safety official pointed out.

Leading high-speed accident producers, the record shows, are passing another vehicle without sufficient clearance and swinging into the wrong traffic lane on curves.

Spruce Budworm Infestation Told

PENDLETON, Ore., July 26 (AP)—Infestation of spruce budworm in the Umatilla national forest—with epidemic stages in some districts—was reported today.

Forest Supervisor Carl Ewing said the Heppner, Walla Walla, and Vale districts are hardest hit.

Large-scale spraying was done by plane, in May, during the period when the spruce budworm is most vulnerable. Ewing said there might be another stage when the insect could also be attacked—probably in August. Entomologists plan to experiment with treatments on 3000 acres of the forest next month.

Payroll Figure Up Over 1948

SALEM, July 26 (AP)—June payrolls of firms covered by the State Industrial Accident commission totaled \$53,266,160. This was \$700,000 less than in May, but was \$4,000,000 more than in June, 1948.

In Multnomah county, the June payroll was \$20,149,733. That also was \$700,000 less than in May, but it was \$700,000 more than in June, 1948.

Job Outlook Looking Up For Oregon

SALEM, July 26 (AP)—The next few months are expected to be easier on job-hunters in Oregon.

The state unemployment compensation commission said a survey indicated late August and early September should find about 5 per cent more workers on payrolls.

Food processing, construction, lumbering and retail trade are the most likely prospects for anyone looking for work, the report said.

The commission reported:

1. Construction employment has gone up ten per cent since April; should climb as much more before the fall peak.
2. Food processing plants will have a total of only slightly below last year's 26,500 top number of workers.
3. Lumbering expects about 7 per cent more men on the job for August-September—but notes the industry still is 12,000 jobs behind the 1948 level at this time last year.
4. Textiles and apparel plants expect October will see 9 per cent

more persons on the payrolls than in June.

5. Retail tradesmen expect an upswing in business—will need about 8 per cent more workers in October than in June.
6. Transportation and communication employers see a slight drop by late summer.
7. Wholesale firms believe payrolls will go slightly for late summer, then decline again by mid-fall.
