## Stocks Stage Slow Gains

NEW YORK, July 26 (AP)—A slowly rising stock market gathered momentum as trading progressed today.

After a fumbling start, buying interest sharpened and leading issues moved up fractions to more than a point. Steels, rails and motors were among the strongest groups.

Trading was brisk off and on but sales figures were distorted—as they were several times last week—by heavy business in Commonwealth and Southern. Turnover was at the rate of about 1,300,000 shares, of which C&S accounted for 300,000 or thereabouts.

General Motors was a strong spot with a rise of around a point.

Commonwealth and Southern matched its high for the year at 4 1/4. Also up were U. S. Steel, Bethlehem Steel, Chrysler, Southern Pacific, Goodrich, Montgomery Ward, American Telephone, Sinclair Oil, and Texas Co.

American Woolen declined on limited turnover. The company just announced price reduction on 1950 spring worsted which, a spokesman said, was one of the largest since the first world war.

## GRAIN FUTURES FOLD TODAY

**CHICAGO, July 26 (AP)—**Grain futures folded up today, with wheat and corn dipping more than 3 cents a bushel at times after yesterday's upturn.

Several factors were responsible for liquidation. These included the government report of heavy grain carryovers, rains in the corn and spring wheat regions, and a letup in the heavy flour buying of the last two previous sessions.

Wheat closed 1/2 to 2 1/2 cents lower than the previous finish, September \$2.03 1/2, corn was down 2 1/2 to 3 cents, September \$1.26 1/2, oats were 1 1/2 to 1 3/4 lower, September 65 1/2, rye was off 4 1/2 to 5 1/2 cents, September \$1.51 1/2-1.52, soybeans were 1 to 2 cents lower, November \$2.27-2.26 1/2, and lard was down 1 to 1 1/2 cents a hundred pounds, September \$11.47.

## Pay Boost For Smith Voted Down

City councilmen were at odds last night over a salary boost for City Recreation Director Sam Smith, and in secret ballot the pay raise was defeated by the slim margin of 3 to 2.

Council President Darrel Miller was the champion for the raise and felt that if it were not granted, "one of the top recreation directors in the country would be plucked out from underneath our noses."

Smith is now getting \$4140 annually, and the recreation committee is asking for \$4500.

Miller based his arguments on the fact that the recommendation came from the recreation committee which said its budget would stand the raise. An approval from the council would "not cost the city a cent," Miller argued.

The matter first came up during recent budget-appropriating sessions. The recreation department had turned in a budget in April and another in June. The first called for the \$360 annual raise, while the second omitted this item.
