A crowd of several hundred people attended the picnic and dedication program held under the joint sponsorship of the Civic Improvement club of Fort Klamath and the Oregon state board of forestry on Sunday, July 24, when the 20-acre state forest tract at the head of Wood river was formally dedicated in memory of the late Jackson F. Kimball, pioneer forester.

The program started at 2:30 p. m. and included musical numbers, officials, and a talk by Malcolm Epley, managing editor of The Herald and News, and the presentation of Mrs. Jackson F. Kimball following the dedication speech by J. F. Daggett of Prineville, Mrs. Kimball, widow of the late forestry official, made a special trip here from her home at La Jolla, Calif., to be present at the park dedication ceremonies.

Of interest to local people present, as well as many former old-time Wood River valley residents, also in attendance was a letter read by Epley during the course of his interesting address on "Historical Significance of the Area."

The letter was received by the local Herald and News correspondent from Mrs. H. B. "Ben" Loosley, now of Malin, in response to an inquiry about early historical data of the Yawkey tract, and was subsequently sent to Epley. Mrs. Loosley taught school here in 1901, and had a timber claim on the Yawkey tract, and she told of this and other interesting matters in her letter. Mr. and Mrs. Loosley were residents here for many years, at one time owning and operating a grocery store and running the post office in Fort Klamath, later engaging in ranching at their ranch two miles north of here. Several years ago, they sold their local property and moved to Malin, where they have lived quietly since that time. Many old friends were pleased and surprised to hear the letter read, Mr. and Mrs. Loosley being among the beloved old-time residents of whom there are only too few left.

PORTLAND, July 28 (AP)—A multi-million-dollar bid on part of the McNary dam has been approved although it was 2 1/2 per cent over the corps of engineers' estimate, Col. O. E. Walsh, North Pacific division engineer, reported Wednesday.

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## Fighting In China Gains; Reds Move

CANTON, China, July 28 (AP)—A government spokesman estimated Wednesday the communists have plun­ged 400,000 to 500,000 troops into renewed fighting in Central China.

The spokesman, Gen. Teng Wen-yi, did not go into the nationalist strength. He said there has been no big clash between opposing forces and that government armies were intact.

"We are waiting," he told news­men, "for the best time and place to deal the communists a death blow."

Other nationalist sources, how­ever, acknowledged further red ad­vances into Hunan province. Garri­son headquarters ordered martial law in this refugee capital, effective today. (An Associated Press dis­patch from red-held Nanking re­ported the communist high com­mand has ordered capture of Canton before Aug. 15.)

Gen. Teng said the reds have six army groups in Central China— three under Lin Piao, three under one-eyed Liu Po-cheng. He gave their immediate objectives as: 1. Cut the Canton-Hankow railroad and isolate Changsha, Hunan capital; 2. Attack Hengyang, 255 miles north of Canton.

"It is conceded that if the reds sweep up Hunan province, the nationalist area to the south—Canton included—will topple."
