

Oregon Given Split 40-Day Duck Shoot

WASHINGTON, July 30 (AP)—Duck hunters in Washington and Alaska will have 50 days of straight shooting this fall—10 more than last year—while in Idaho and Oregon they will have split seasons of 20 days each, an increase of six.

The liberalized migratory waterfowl hunting regulations were announced by Secretary of the Interior Krug yesterday. The choice between split and continuous seasons lay with the states.

Oregon seasons are from October 21 to November 9, and December 19 to January 7.

Pittsburg Turns In 5-4 Win Over Gems

PITTSBURG, July 30 (Special)—Catcher Milt Martin homered with two on and two out in the last of the ninth to bring the Pittsburg Diamonds a 5-4 victory over the Klamath Falls Gems as a showdown series between the two strongest clubs in the class D circuit opened here.

Another game is scheduled tonight and another Sunday. Then the clubs will go to Klamath Falls for three beginning Tuesday.

The Diamonds were down 4-2 going into the last of the ninth, and Gem's Pitcher Johnny Lopeman got two out of the way by a double play. Then Ed Whitney singled to left and Bob Tate doubled to the same field, his fly barely eluding Mike Fernandez. Whitney stopped at third.

Martin hit a 2-3 pitch over the left field boards for the payoff. The Gems had scored one run in the second, then picked up two more in the fifth when Ken Jensen homered with one on. The last Gem tally came in the seventh on an error, a walk and a single by Jensen.

Pittsburg got two in the third on three singles and a walk, then went scoreless until the ninth. Lopeman gave up 14 hits but his mates made four double killings behind him to stifle the same number of rallies.

Pete Hernandez, pitching for the Diamonds, struck out nine and allowed just six hits. Lopeman fanned seven and walked two. Obedon Hernandez of the Gems was chased from the game in the second by Umpire Mark Tibbo for a prolonged dispute over a strike call, and Mike Fernandez replaced him in the left pasture.

The victory stretched Pittsburg's league lead to four games.
