

Gems Wobble Under Double Sabbath Loss

Vallejo Disbands Leaving Circuit With Seven Clubs

Pittsburg's Diamonds, just too hot to handle these days, ripped a couple of seven-inning victories from the Klamath Falls Gems Sunday in their Far West league lead over the Klamath Falls team to six full games. The scores were 5-0 and 4-2.

The Diamonds made it a clean sweep, hurler Blair Simpson did the whitewash job in the first game, hanging up his eleventh consecutive victory. He has not tasted defeat this year. Lou Bronson held the Gems to six hits in the second game and got successive doubles by Vince DiMaggio and Tony Filippo in the bottom of the sixth to account for the two-run margin.

Nile Jordan and Joe Nicholas were the victims. Elsewhere around the circuit over the week-end, the Vallejo Chiefs made tough resistance to the Medford Nuggets Saturday night and Sunday, then dropped out of the league. Medford won 12-8 and 13-2.

The Far West wheel probably will finish the season with just seven spokes and a new schedule will have to be drawn up for the remainder of the term. Vallejo was in seventh place and was homeless after being kicked out of AFL park in Vallejo.

The Willows Cardinals took two from the Santa Rosa Cats, winning 11-7 Saturday night and 6-3 last night. Redding lost to the Marysville Braves 7-6 Saturday and won 11-7 last night.

Saturday night, at Pittsburg rain washed out the scheduled Klamath Falls game, first time this season the Diamonds have had to take a back seat to the weather. Hence, the twin-bill on Sunday.

HARD TO BEAT
The double victory by Pittsburg brought their victory march to 18 wins in their last 19 games and put them completely out of touch with the rest of the circuit for the time being. A three-game series with the Gems starts here tomorrow night and if the Spuds win them all they'd still be three notches ahead.

Jordan gave up six hits and four runs to the Diamonds before going out in favor of Stan Gilson in the fourth frame of the first game. The Gems got nine hits but they were so scattered that Pinky Hesse had three of them and Gordy Hernandez had three.

In the second game the Diamonds, who usually can be pretty tame for Nicholas, overcame the jinx with two-run clusters in the second and sixth frames. Ralph Mohler batted in both Klamath runs singling with Bob Casselli on base on both occasions.

Nicholas fanned five and walked two. Bronson struck out three and walked one.

ST. PAUL, Minn., Aug. 1 (AP)—Sam Snead, the White Sulphur Springs, W. Va., professional who says he's "tired of golf" had something today to relieve that tired feeling.

It was the \$2600 he won yesterday by taking first place in the 48th annual western open with a 72-hole total of 268. That score bettered the western open record of 270, set in 1947 by Johnny Palmer, Bahin, N. C., and equaled the record for the 6557-yard Keller course, set in 1946 by Henry Ransom.

Snead's first-place money increased his winnings in the professional golfers lists to \$23,560.83, with Middlecoff staying right behind him with a total of \$21,924.37.

Victory Shoves Brooklyn Back Into Flag Chase

DON Newcombe, big Negro right-hander of the Brooklyn Dodgers who has had his ups and downs, has something to smile about today.

He's turned the tables on his chief tormentors—the St. Louis Cardinals. Solidly cuffed in three previous encounters with the rollicking Redbirds, Newcombe clipped the league-leaders, 4-2, yesterday to snap the Cards' nine-game winning streak and put the Bums back in the National league race.

Newcombe had the Cards' number. The largest St. Louis crowd of the season, 32,963 fans saw the big fellow check the Cards on eight hits.

He blanked the league leaders until the ninth when singles by Ron Northey, Glen Nelson and Lou Klein plus Duke Snider's first error of the season allowed the Cards to score twice. Newcombe got Pinch-hitter Bill Baker to ground out to end the game.

The victory put the Cards' advantage over the Dodgers to one and a half games. The New York Yankees stretched their American league lead to four games over the second place Cleveland Indians.

The Yanks split a twin bill with the Chicago White Sox, taking the opener, 3-1, and dropping the nightcap, 2-1, in ten innings. The Indians were blanked, 3-0, by Maurice McDermott and the Red Sox in Boston.
