

Nationalists Admit Gains By Red Troops

Communist armies in China spear-headed southward on three fronts today. Nationalists admitted red gains in Hunan, Kiangsi and Kansu provinces.
In Hunan, the rice bowl province, communists are 313 miles north of Canton and again have cut the Canton-Hankow railway. In Kansu province, the communists threatened vast northwestern China, ruled by Moslem warlords.
A Chinese nationalist source in Seoul, capital of non-communist Korea, said Generalissimo Chiang Kai-shek is expected to arrive there tomorrow to discuss a proposed Pacific pact with President Syngman Rhee. Chiang made a similar call on the president of the Philippines recently.

Flying Farmers Gird For Showdown Battle With SBA

LEBANON, Aug. 2 (AP)—Oregon flying farmers have postponed until August 4 a meeting planned to air their charges that the state board of aeronautics and its director have been wasting funds on useless projects. The meeting will be in Portland.
The accusations were made public Saturday by the Oregon flying farmers, the Oregon sportsmen pilots, and the aerial spray and dust operators.
In letters to Governor Douglas McKay, the airmen accused the board of "mismanagement and flagrant waste of our money."
They challenged the qualifications of Aeronautics Director W. M. Bartlett, saying that state law provided that the director should be an expert in the aeronautics field.
Claude Williams, Prineville, head of the flying farmers, said that while they did not question the integrity of any man on the board, they felt the board had not accomplished many tangible results.
He proposed that vacancies be created on the board to make room for Ralph Scroggins, Lebanon, and Jack Lennig, Haynes.
Board Chairman Ben Ruffner defended the selection of Bartlett for aeronautics head, saying that at the time of the appointment the board's main objective was airport development, and that Bartlett—experienced in public works planning and airport planning—seemed a logical choice.

'Satira' In Spot Again

CLEVELAND, Aug. 2 (AP)—Dancing Patricia "Satira" Schmidt of Toledo is in the limelight again.
The 24-year-old creator of exotic dances was named correspondent in a separate maintenance suit filed by a Cleveland housewife yesterday.
Mrs. Louise Ann Salupo, 34, mother of three children, said in a petition that her husband, Sebastian, 35, spent this last week-end with Miss Schmidt in Calumet City, Ill.
Last October, Miss Schmidt was released on a presidential pardon from the Guantanamo women's prison in Cuba after serving more than a year for killing her married lover, John Mee, Chicago attorney. The slaying occurred aboard Mee's yacht, "Satira," as it lay in Havana harbor.
Informed of the current court action, the black haired "Satira" said she does not know Salupo and does not "recognize the name." She is now appearing at a Calumet City night club.

State Police Nab Drunk Driver

Compromise Farm Bill Proposed

WASHINGTON, Aug. 2 (AP)—Senator Anderson (D-N. M.) today proposed a compromise farm bill to break the congressional deadlock over farm legislation.
One section of the Anderson proposal would allow Secretary of Agriculture Brannan to try out his "production payments" plan on oranges, grapefruit, apples, vegetables and similar farm products classed as "non-storable perishables."
The other two sections of the Anderson compromise—being considered at closed sessions of a senate agriculture subcommittee—would:
1. Put into operation a "flexible price-support" program of from 75 to 90 per cent of parity for so-called basic crops. These include corn, wheat, cotton, tobacco, rice and peanuts. This is a modification of the Aiken law which provides for 60 to 90 per cent of parity. The Aiken law is due to go into effect next January.
"A parity price is one intended to give a farm product the same relative purchase power it had in a past favorable period."
2. Allow a similar flexible support program for meats, butter, cheese, wool, oats, rye and similar "non-basic" but storable commodities, if effective control programs are approved by the secretary of agriculture.

Virginia Vote Tests Byrd

RICHMOND, Va., Aug. 2 (AP)—United States Senator Harry F. Byrd's leadership of the democratic party in Virginia for 25 years was at stake today in the state's primary to nominate a governor.
More than 300,000 Virginia democrats were predicted to cast their vote today in a gubernatorial primary contest that has not been so heated in this state for a quarter of a century.
Though Byrd's name does not appear on the ballot, most voters will be consciously voting for or against the party organization which he has dominated.
The primary brought to a close a four-cornered democratic gubernatorial race, in which Byrd for the first time in his political career openly endorsed a candidate. He threw his weight of influence behind the candidacy of State Senator John S. Battle.
The avowed opponent of the Byrd organization in the race is Francis Pickens Miller, former legislator. Other candidates are Horace H. Edwards, a former mayor of Richmond, and Remmie L. Arnold, pen and pencil manufacturer of Petersburg.

Public Kissing Cost Now \$10

GALESVILLE, Md., Aug. 2 (AP)—Because he was so vehement about his right to be kissed in public by his wife, Roy Miffleton, 31, of Washington is \$10 poorer today.
Miffleton was fined that amount yesterday by Trial Magistrate Norman Hazard after testimony at a hearing developed that quite a rumpus ensued following a wifey kiss on an outing Sunday at Mayo beach on Chesapeake bay.
Mrs. Mary Trabing, wife of the resort owner, objected to such goings-on in public.
Miffleton objected to her objecting. Words flew hot and heavy. A crowd gathered. And then the police came.
At the trial, Judge Hazard said he wasn't fining Miffleton for publicly kissing his wife but for disorderly conduct afterward.

Pensioner's Bodies Not Available

SALEM, Aug. 2 (AP)—Old age pensioners don't have to worry for fear their bodies will be used for scientific purposes when they die.
Attorney General George Neuner ruled Monday that the pensioners' bodies don't come under a 1949 law, which lets medical schools use bodies of persons buried at public expense.
The opinion was requested by Governor Douglas McKay.
In an opinion for State Treasurer Walter J. Pearson, Neuner ruled that money recovered in damage suits for wrongful death is not subject to inheritance taxes.
Neuner ruled for the state board of health that the Masonic and Eastern Star home at Forest Grove does not have to be licensed by the board.

Health Funds Get Committee Okay

WASHINGTON, Aug. 2 (AP)—The senate labor committee today unanimously approved a bill authorizing about \$95,000,000 in federal grants the next two years for training health personnel.
Senator Pepper (D-Fla.) announced the action. He called the measure "substantially an administration bill" in line with a section of the general health program President Truman recently submitted to congress.
The bill does not deal with another more controversial section of the Truman program which calls for national health insurance.
