BOSTON, Aug. 3 (AP)—At least a half dozen of some 160 college athletic powers which subscribe to the NCAA "sanity code" are in for a rude shock Aug. 12. On that day from Chicago they will be cited for violations of the code governing athletic policies. The rebukes developed after last week's meeting of college athletic commissioners at New Castle, N.H. Generally, the NCAA compliance committee is enthusiastic about conditions in intercollegiate sports.

Summer baseball for many years has been a sore subject with colleges, the athletes and promoters of summer leagues. Two years ago players in the jurisdiction of the Eastern college AA were banned from the Northern league, an independent circuit in Vermont and New Hampshire.

Gems Hand Pinky Victory

Hernandez Shines At Bat In 16-7 Diamond Win; Lopeman Hurls

Cash, commodities and even a car (1936 model) were lavished on 18-year-old Pinky Hesse at Gems stadium last night as the Klamath Falls centerfielder was honored with a "night" of his own, and in the ensuing baseball game Hesse and the Gems decked the Pittsburg Diamonds 16-7. The loss pared one notch off Pittsburg's Par West league lead, making it five games now.

Hesse thanked his well-wishers by getting three singles in five times up, scoring three times and swiping a couple of bases as well as playing flawlessly in the field, but in the offensive department he had to take a back seat to Gordy Hernandez.

On two occasions, the third and sixth innings, the Diamonds elected to walk Bob Caselli to lead the bases with one out and try for a double play. Hernandez followed Caselli in the batting order and he collected a double and triple to clear the bases each time.

He also had a single and batted in six runs.

A couple of Pittsburg errors and three hits in the first inning let in three Klamath runs and got Pitcher Bill Carr off to a bad start. By the time he went out in the fourth, the Gems had a 10-0 lead.

Johnny Lopeman, winning his 15th game for the Spuds, pitched no-hit no-run ball for four innings. The first base blow off him was a single by Vince DiMaggio starting the fifth frame.

All Pittsburg's seven hits were singles, two of them by Ed Whitney and two by Tony Filippino. In the sixth frame the Diamonds batted all the way around and scored five runs.

The second game of the series will be played tonight, starting at 7:45.

Elsewhere in the circuit, Santa Rosa defeated Redding 8-5 and Willows topped the Marysville Braves 7-6.

Detroit Makes AL Four-Team Race, Beat NY

Newhouser Notches Eleventh Victory In 10-2 Fracas

Watch out, New York! Shove over, Cleveland and Boston. Make room for another claimant to the American league throne—the dashing Detroit Tigers.

A week ago the odds manipulators had written off the pennant chances of the Tigers. A three-team race it was, they said. Today, these same odds-makers are stuing a new line with Detroit given a chance to cop, albeit a slim one.

They enhanced their chances considerably last night when they turned back the Yankees, 10-2, in the league leaders' back yard.

The victory gave the fourth place Bengals a record of 13 triumphs in their last 18 games, a much faster gain than that of the Yankees, runner-up Indians or third place Red Sox. It moved them within seven and a half games of the top.

Hal Newhouser, who had failed in six straight July attempts to notch his 11th victory, finally made it with a 10-hit performance against the Yankees.

The Tigers backed Newhouser's pitching with a 14-hit attack which blasted Alie Reynolds from the hill. Four of the blows went for the distance. The homer hitters were Dick Wakefield, Vic Wertz, Aaron Robinson and Johnny Lipon.

The Indians whipped weary Washington, 8-1, as Early Wynn held his former mates to nine scattered hits for his ninth victory. Bob Kennedy, Joe Gordon and Dale Mitchell paced the Indians' 15-hit assault on Mickey Harris and Al Gettel with three safeties apiece. The triumph cut the Yankees' margin to three and a half games.

The Red Sox tallied once in the last half of the ninth to eke out a 4-3 win over the St. Louis Browns. Don DiMaggio singled to open the frame, got around to third, and scored the deciding run when Vern Stephens rolled down the first base line while trying to duck a pitch by Ned Garver. The hit extended DiMag's consecutive hitting streak through 29 games.

SOX MOVE UP
The triumph moved the third place Sox to within six games of the Yankees.

The Philadelphia Athletics ended a three-game losing streak and a 27-inning scoreless drought, defeating the Chicago White Sox, 8-3.

The St. Louis Cardinals retained their half game advantage over Brooklyn in the National league race, coming from behind to defeat the Boston Braves, 7-2. Red Munger pitched a five-hitter for his 10th victory. Stan Mustal led the 11-hit attack with a double, triple and single.

The Brooklyn Dodgers downed the Pittsburgh Pirates, 5-2, behind the five-hit pitching of Rex Barney. Gil Hodges hit a home run and double to drive in three Dodger runs. Bob Chances was the loser.

The Cincinnati Reds exploded with 15 hits to swamp the Philadelphia Phils, 11-3.

In the only afternoon contest, the New York Giants shut out the Chicago Cubs, 3-0, for their fifth consecutive victory. Sheldon Jones pitched a three-hitter for his ninth success.
