Shortage Of Teachers Seen

SALEM, Aug. 3 (AP)—Oregon's teacher shortage will remain serious when the school term opens next month, Rex Putnam, state superintendent of public instruction, said Tuesday.

He said there are enough teachers around cities, but the situation is difficult in rural areas.

Putnam predicted 1700 emergency teaching certificates will have been issued by the time school starts, which would be the same figure as last year.

He said all emergency certificates will be for teachers in the lower eight grades. No more such certificates will be given for high school.

Emergency certificates are issued to teachers who can't meet normal requirements in education and training.

There are slightly more than 10,000 teachers in the state.
