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Reds Charge Tito With Slave Labor

LONDON, Aug. 4 (AP)—Russia accused Marshal Tito Wednesday of using Greek communist refugees as slave labor in the Yugoslav iron and copper mines.

The official Soviet news agency Tass said the metal is sold to Americans and "made into guns for the Greek royalist-fascists."

At one time the western allies regarded Yugoslavia as a main refuge and jumping-off place for Greek rebels ducking back and forth across the border in their skirmishes with government troops.

Recently, Tito ordered the border sealed. He said the Greek communists had taken sides against him along with the nations of the Russian-dominated cominform.

The cominform denounced Tito last year for putting nationalism above the communist party line.

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Netherlands OK's Pact

THE HAGUE, Aug. 4.—The upper house of the Netherlands parliament ratified the North Atlantic treaty Wednesday. The vote was 29 to 2.

This completed parliamentary action by the Netherlands and constituted the next to the last stage before the treaty goes into effect. All the original partners in the pact—the United States, Britain, France, Canada, Belgium, the Netherlands and Luxembourg—now have ratified the accord.

The treaty will become formally effective when the instruments of ratification of the various governments are deposited in Washington.

Communists cast the two votes against ratification in the Netherlands upper house. The lower house accepted the pact, 69 to 7, on July 19.
