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Navy Ships Reach Point Barrow Docks

SEATTLE, Aug. 4 (AP)—First units of the 1949 Point Barrow supply expedition have reached that northernmost Alaska point and started unloading cargo, the navy reported Wednesday.

An advance unit of LST's (landing ship tanks) and the ice breaker Burton Island arrived at Point Barrow late Tuesday and immediately started unloading their portion of the 45,000-ton cargo destined for the navy's oil project and other government operations.

Capt. Monroe N. Riker, commander of the advance unit, left on a reconnaissance flight to study ice conditions in the area surrounding Barter Island, 200 miles southwest of Point Barrow.

If conditions are favorable the ice breaker and two LST's will get under way at once for Barter Island, the final stop of the expedition.

The expedition flagship, George Clymer, and other units were expected to reach Point Barrow today.

James Holland To Retire From SP

DUNSMUIR, Aug. 4.—James L. Holland, Southern Pacific conductor, has announced his retirement from the company because of disability, after 30 years service.

He began work here as a brakeman in June, 1919, and was promoted to conductor in September, 1925.

Mr. and Mrs. Holland will continue to make their home at 524 North Highway. They have a son, James R., who is a locomotive fireman here, and a daughter, Miss Edith Holland, editor of the Dunsmuir News.

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Legionnaires Buckle Down At Session

SALEM, Aug. 4 (AP)—Business sessions of Oregon's 31st annual American Legion convention got under way today as almost 4000 delegates crowded the city.

Chief interest was on the election of officers, with Sam M. Bowe, a World War II veteran from Grants Pass, the only announced candidate for state commander. But Eastern Oregon delegates were hunting for a candidate to oppose him. The election will be held Saturday.

The city breathed easier today after the 40th & 8th fun-making branch of the Legion, was through with yesterday's antics. They put on a big noise-making parade, doing such things as squirting the spectators with fire hoses and throwing their "bombs" at them.

Hillsboro's harem. Ashland's bagpipes and Albany's boxer took top places in the 40 & 8 parade.

W. E. Wilkins, La Grande, was elected grand chief de gare of the state 40 & 8, succeeding Dr. M. E. Cooper of Klamath Falls. The title

of grand chief de gare is equivalent to president.

Two candidates for national Legion commander were here today to do a little politicking in their own behalf. They are Eric Cooke Jr., Dawson, Ga., and James Green, Omaha, Neb., both World War II veterans. They will run at the national convention in Philadelphia late in August.

The sessions of the Legion opened formally this morning with a joint meeting of the Legion and auxiliary, and a special memorial service for dead Legionnaires. Speakers included Frank N. Belgrano, Portland, past national commander; Governor Douglas McKay and Mayor Robert Elstrom.

The first session to transact business was scheduled for this afternoon, and the grand convention banquet will be held tonight.

Fire Rips Ochoco Area

PRINEVILLE, Aug. 4 (AP)—A second lightning-born fire was burning over an estimated 1000 acres on the Ochoco national forest today.

The fire broke away rapidly yesterday, just as another blaze 10 miles away was being brought under control, and swept over a flat expanse of scattered timber, grass, and sagebrush.

Vern Everett of the Deschutes national forest flew over the area this morning and estimated the extent at 1000 acres—with some unburned islands amid the blackened area.

A windless day was aiding firefighters, however, and the relatively flat terrain made drawing fire

lines easier. Foresters hoped to surround the blaze before a 15-mile-an-hour wind, forecast for late today, materialized.

Three hundred men, five bulldozers, and two caterpillar tractors were working on the big blaze and a smaller, 350-acre fire which has already been trailed.

Both fires started during lightning storms Monday, on the eastern edge of the forest. The larger fire is in the Tree-Sulpee district, and the smaller one in the Squaw creek area 10 miles further northwest.

In primitive blast furnaces, hand-operated bellows of skin inside cylinders supplied air to a mixture of iron ore and charcoal in a fire.
