

## AFL Plots All-Out Drive In Politics

BOSTON, Aug. 4 (AP)—The American Federation of Labor is planning to cross party lines in a history-making, million-dollar-plus campaign to defeat four senators and elect eight others in 1950, Joseph D. Keenan of Chicago said today.

Keenan, AFL director of political education, told a press conference held in connection with the Massachusetts Federation of Labor convention that this is the AFL's 1950 aim.

"To elect a congress which will vote for the issues the people want."

The labor organization, he said, will "try to defeat" these senators: Taft (R-Ohio), Capehart (R-Ind.), Donnell (R-Mo.) and Millikin (R-Colo.).

The AFL, he said, will support these senators: McMahon (D-Conn.), Myers (D-Penn.), Hill (D-Ala.), Pepper (D-Fla.), Morse (R-Ore.), Thomas (D-Utah), Lucas (D-Ill.) and Aiken (R-Vt.).

Keenan said the AFL planned to spend \$1,000,000 or more on "the most intensive campaign" in its history.

Funds will be raised by \$2 assessments, he said.

## Smith Not Liable In \$200,000 Suit

EUGENE, Aug. 4 (AP)—A circuit court judge has ruled that Richard Shore Smith, ex-president of the First National bank of Eugene, is not liable for damages in a \$200,000 suit brought by minority stockholders of the bank.

Greta Brewster Tyron brought the suit against Smith, charging she had received too little for her shares of stock when the bank was sold to Trans-America corporation in 1945. The ruling by Judge Dal M. King

applied to nine other plaintiffs who brought similar court actions.

The plaintiffs contended that Smith used his position as president of the bank to get a higher price for his own stock in negotiations with officers of the First National bank in Portland than they could get for theirs.

They claimed they could have received \$400 a share for their stock instead of \$220 if Smith had advised them of its value.

But Smith told the court that majority stock was customarily worth more than minority stock.

## New England Area In Disaster Zone

BOSTON, Aug. 4 (AP)—All New England states except Maine were listed as disaster areas because of the extended drought today.

Farmers who have exhausted all credit sources in Massachusetts, New Hampshire, Vermont, Connecticut and Rhode Island now are eligible for low-interest federal loans.

Maine has had more rain than the other five states.

Some sections of drought-parched New England received some relief yesterday from rain. The fall in Massachusetts was one-half inch.
