Pearson Gives Support To Latourette

PORTLAND, Aug. 5 (AP)—State Treasurer Walter J. Pearson came out today in favor of the appointment of Circuit Judge Earl C. Latourette to Oregon's new federal judgeship.

Pearson, a democrat, said he had tried vainly to persuade Democratic National Committeeman Monroe Sweetland to withdraw his support of Guo J. Solomon, Portland attorney, for the post.

"I told Sweetland that if he continued to support Solomon and Solomon is appointed, it will split the democratic party in Oregon right down the middle. I suggested he withdraw Solomon's name and support the democrats by selecting a man upon whom they can agree."

"He would not agree with me, so I told him if he continued to support Solomon, I would support Latourette. I wrote to the national committee urging Latourette's appointment."

Latourette has the backing of the state democratic central committee chairman.

Government May Enter Lawsuit

PORTLAND, Aug. 5 (AP)—The government may enter the suit in which Columbia river farmers seek damages to cover losses they say they suffered from aluminum plant fumes.

Attorneys for the farmers and the defendant, Reynolds Metals Co., agreed yesterday to let the government enter as an interested party.

Their agreement was forwarded to District Judge James Alger Fee for his possible approval.

The suit may go to trial in November. Numerous farmers maintain they suffered damage from Reynolds plants at Longview, Wash., and Troutdale, Ore. They seek more than \$1,500,000.

Driver Killed In Car Upset

ARLINGTON, Ore., Aug. 5 (AP)—Charles Beard, Vancouver, Wash., was killed yesterday when his car overturned on the Columbia river highway about 17 miles east of here.

Beard was driving with his brother, Elbert, when the car went out of control and rolled over, coming to rest upside down. The crash threw Beard out of the car. Beard's body was taken to The Dalles. The brother, Elbert, suffered only minor cuts and bruises.

Students At Farragut To Get Move Fund

FARRAGUT, Idaho, Aug. 5 (AP)—Students stranded by the closing of Farragut College and Technical Institute have been promised funds to help them move.

James Anderson, business manager, said campus organizations would pool the \$2000 in their treasuries to help students without funds leave the school.

That will take care of the "hardship cases" among the 80 students stranded here when the college directors voted not to reopen this fall. The students, many of them married veterans, stayed on the campus during the summer because plenty of housing is available at this former naval training base.

Other students and several faculty members are searching schools where they can enroll or get jobs. Few of the colleges which will accept students yet for next fall have adequate housing to take married veterans with families, student leaders say.

Anderson said the college will make one last fight for its students. It will do what it can to divert college property leased from the war assets administration to schools which will enroll the students.

Juveniles Facing Theft Charge

DUNSMUIR, Aug. 5—Police Chief Allen B. Costar reported the apprehension of two Dunsmuir boys, aged 10 and 11, for burglary. The brothers broke into the Park grocery Saturday night and stole cigarettes, gum, candy, wine, some small change and a watermelon, which they ate on the scene. The remainder of the loot was hidden in a shack in the rear of their home in Champion park.

The mother reported the boys missing at midnight, Saturday, when she arose to prepare a bottle for a younger child. The boys arrived home shortly thereafter, and it was not until Monday morning that they were identified with the burglary. The youths were taken to Yreka by Probation Officer Lester E. Newton for a hearing in the juvenile court.

Careless Smokers Causing Blazes

OLYMPIA, Wash., Aug. 5 (AP)—A rash of forest blazes touched off by carelessly-tossed cigarettes along roads has plagued the Washington state forestry division. Forester Bernard Orell said today.

He asserted 10 of the 15 fires which blackened 49 acres across the state yesterday were caused by cigarettes.

Cooler weather has eased the fire situation but Orell said the fire hazard was still great in the Columbia river area.

New Power Station Open

WASHINGTON, Aug. 5 (AP)—Rep. Ellsworth (R-Ore.) said today that initiation of use of a new 1000-kilovolt ampere substation at Walton, Ore., will mean better rural electric service in that section.

The new service from the Bonneville power administration's line was started Monday. The substation is in the western load center of the Blachley-Lane county cooperative electric association.

Ellsworth said the new plant will make it possible to extend distribution lines to districts in the Walton area not now having service, and is expected to increase stability of the power supply in winter months.

Provision was made in constructing the substation, Ellsworth noted, for future installation of an additional transformer.
