Spud Check Finished Here

First field inspection of potato seed fields entered for certification in Klamath county was completed early this week. The county agent's office reports approximately 900 acres of Netteed Gems and 450 acres of White Rose passed inspection. Only three fields failed to meet certification requirements. Tolerance for tuber perpetuated leafroll infection at first inspection is 1/2 per cent. Most fields were well below that tolerance. Many fields are well below the one-tenth per cent tolerance allowed at second inspection. Second field inspection will start about August 20. Very little virus disease other than leafroll was found in the course of inspecting Netteed Gem fields. H. E. Fimmel, certification specialist for Oregon State college, and Walt Jendrzejewski, assistant county agent, made the field inspections.
