Grains Under Pressure Today

CHICAGO, Aug. 9 (P)—Grains were under pressure during the greater part of today's board of trade session. Losses ranged from fractions to more than a cent, but traders could not find a peg to hang a rally on, until near the close.

Soybeans suffered the most severe setback, off around 4 cents at times.

Feed grains fluctuated less than wheat.

At the close wheat was 1/4 higher to 1/2 lower than yesterday's close. September \$2.04 1/2-1/4. Corn was unchanged to 1/4 lower, September \$1.25 1/2-1/4. Oats were 1/4 higher to 1/2 lower, September 66-66 1/2. Rye was unchanged to 1/4 lower, September \$1.50 1/2. Soybeans were 1 1/2 to 2 1/2 lower, November \$2.37-2.37 1/2. Lard was 25 to 42 cents a hundred-weight lower, September \$12.87.

Stock Rally Slips Today

NEW YORK, Aug. 9 (P)—The two-day mid-summer rally in the stock market slipped back a notch today. Prices were down by fractions to around a point, and the volume of trading was at the rate of 1,200,000 for the entire day. Yesterday volume was 1,800,000.

Rails and utilities on the whole lagged behind the rest of the market in the decline with a number unchanged.

Nickel Plate was up around 3 points at one time. Earlier in the day one block of 12,900 sold unchanged at 70 1/2.

Others gaining included Canadian Pacific, Admiral Corp., Zenith and International Paper.

On the downside were Union Carbide, Allied Chemical, U. S. Steel, Union Pacific, Standard Oil (N.J.), International Nickel, Celanese, Westinghouse, Boeing, Sears Roebuck, General Motors and Studebaker.
