## Dominic's Hitting Spree Chopped In 6-3 Boston Win

If the Boston Red Sox ever catch up with the New York Yankees in their season-long American league pennant chase, most of the credit must be given to their much maligned pitching staff.

In the last five weeks, during which time the Red Sox have picked up six and a half games on the front-running Yankees, Boston hurlers have pitched 25 complete games in 34 starts. As a result, they've won 25 of them and whittled their deficit to five and a half games. On July 4 the Red Sox trailed the leaders by 12 games.

Elli Kinder, the Red Sox' right-handed ace, is the latest to go the route. He finished what he started last night, beating the Yankees, 6-3, for his 13th victory against five losses.

Kinder permitted the Yankees 10 hits, including a pair of home runs by outfielder Hank Bauer, but an early 6-0 lead furnished by Birdie Tebbetts and Tom Williams carried him through. Tebbetts parked one two-run homer in the second, and Williams duplicated the catcher's feat in the third.

### HIT STREAK ENDED

A capacity crowd of 35,691 was made happy by Boston's first victory of the season over Raschi, a note of disappointment crept in, however, by the inability of Dom DiMaggio to prolong his consecutive game hitting streak. The Red Sox centerfielder, who has hit in 24 consecutive games, was held hitless in five trips to the plate.

Williams' homer, his 28th of the season, was the 250th of his career. The triumph, Boston's 12th in 19 starts in this current home stand, left the third place Sox still a game behind the runner up Cleveland Indians. The tribe whipped the St. Louis Browns, 9-2, to reduce the Yankees' lead to four and a half games.

Bob Feller gained his fourth straight and 10th victory of the season as the Indians ended a three-game losing streak. The star righthander aided his own cause with a bases-loaded single in the fifth and a double in the eighth.

The fourth place Philadelphia Athletics and fifth place Detroit Tigers won their games, to move forward also. The A's, aided by 15 bases on balls, defeated Washington, 8-3, and the Tigers Walloped the Chicago White Sox, 11-5. The A's are now 7 1/2 games behind, the Tigers 9.

### KNOT REMAINS

Brooklyn and St. Louis continued in their first place National league deadlock. The Dodgers whipped the Philadelphia Phils, 8-1, and the Cardinals won from Cincinnati, 4-1. The New York Giants protected their hold on third place by edging out the Boston Braves, 4-3. In the only daylight contest, the Pittsburgh Pirates slugged the Chicago Cubs, 8-3.

Rookie Carl Erskine hurled three-hit ball for Brooklyn. He lost his shutout in the ninth when Bill Nicholson tripled and scored on a fielder's choice.

Southpaw Harry Brechen permitted the Reds only seven hits and did not issue a pass to post his ninth victory for the Cardinals. He helped his cause with a single and triple.

# Gems Hold Top Spot In Fielding, At Bat

Klamath Falls, second in Far West league standings with just four more weeks of play, ranks first in team batting and also first in team fielding. League Statistician Bill Weiss of San Francisco reports.

The Gems have a .304 team hitting percentage and are 17 points ahead of Willows in that respect. Willows has averaged .287 and Pittsburg .284. Klamath Falls has a .339 fielding percentage and Willows is second in that department also with .938.

The Gems lead in total stolen bases, doubles and triples. Pinky Hesse has 28 stolen bases to his credit, through last Monday night's game at Willows and Gordon Hernandez has 25. Ben Jeffrey of Marysville has swiped 27 bags. Hesse is the league leader in three-base hits with 11.

Ray Perry of Medford holds most of the individual batting honors. His average of .420 has been built on 39 homers and 137 runs batted in. Hesse had hit safely 143 times to lead in that department.

The leading hitter, percentage-wise, among the Gems still is Bob Casselli who has an average of .370. Casselli ranks third in the league behind Perry and Vince DiMaggio now.

Among the pitchers Blair Simp-

son's 11-0 record for Pittsburg is tops, but several Far West hurlers have a dozen wins or more. Bill Carr of Marysville has a 15-6 record, Herb Hamill of Marysville 13-4, Pete Swain of Marysville 13-6, Johnny Lopeman of Klamath Falls 14-7, and Niles Jordan of Klamath Falls 13-6.

# Hillsboro Drubs Beyerly For AL Title

## Upstaters Turn Tables In Second; Win Regional Spot

ALBANY, Ore., Aug. 10 (AP)—Hillsboro captured the Oregon American Legion junior baseball championship last night and a berth in the regional tournament starting in Portland Friday.

The upstate team won the crown by drubbing the Portland Beyerly's, 11 to 1, in a second game of the night after the challengers from the big city edged Hillsboro, 9 to 8, in the first.

A Hillsboro victory in that initial game would have given the previously unbeaten team the crown on six straight, but it wasn't that easy. In that first game, Beyerly's took an early lead and then snuffed off a ninth inning Hillsboro rally at one run to squeeze out the 9 to 8 win. Hillsboro got eleven hits off Jim Petersen, who went the route, but he had scattered them effectively in all but two innings.

The second game was virtually no contest, with five runs in the fifth inning the crown for Hillsboro. Jim Niernan, who played first base in the initial contest, batted two-hit ball while his team mates loosed a 12-hit barrage off three Portland pitchers.

## 47-State Champ Rules 18-5 Favorite To Punch Holes In Veteran Lesnevich

NEW YORK, Aug. 10 (AP)—Ezzard Charles rules a solid 5 to 18 favorite to punch 34-year-old Gus Lesnevich full of holes tonight at Yankee stadium in the first defense of his newly-won NBA heavyweight boxing championship. The 15-round bout is scheduled for 7 p. m. (Pacific Daylight Time).

Only 49 days after he cautiously outboxed Jersey Joe Wolcott to win the crown, the lean 28-year-old

Cincinnati Negro rushes to the post in an effort to convince New York skeptics of his right to be called "champ."

No matter how soon he may knock out Gus, if at all, Charles will not be champ in New York state. Eddie Egan, chairman of the state athletic commission, has ruled the winner must meet Lee Savold or "some suitable opponent" before he gives his official blessing. Ezzard is king in the other 47 states.

It figures to be a good fight, while it lasts, perhaps even sensational, for Lesnevich is prepared to shoot the works early. The vet from Cliffside Park, N. J., can punch with either hand. He says he will go to Charles' body but may surprise by head-hunting with his stiff left hook.
