

Council Of Europe Split On Germany

BRIDGE TELETYPE COUNCIL

STRASBOURG, France, Aug. 10 (AP)—Former French Premier Bernard Hériot said today a division of minds exists on the question of admitting Germans to the new council of Europe.

In a prepared address to the opening session of the council's consultative assembly Hériot indicated western Germany would have to work her way into the organization with proofs that she no longer harbors aggressive intentions.

He told the 101 delegates from 12 nations that the assembly would deal with "problems of life and death" for Europe.

"A closer association of Europe presents itself as a matter of urgency," he said.

Many political leaders of Western Europe hope that the discussions here will mark a long advance toward the goal of full unity of that portion of Europe outside the Soviet orbit.

Proposal Made

There have been proposals to include Western Germany in the organization as soon as the new West German government is functioning. It was thought that Hériot's statement on the question perhaps reflected the point of view of the French delegation. France has a deep-seated fear of German aggression based on experiences of history.

Hériot, a leader in the movement for European unity, paid special tribute to Winston Churchill, declaring: "From his mind sprang the movement which has brought us together here." Churchill, one of the British parliamentary delegates, was seated in the second row.

Earlier members of the consultative assembly talked revolt against the dominating powers of the ministerial committee within the council.

On all sides, members of Europe's new semi-legislative body voiced complaints against the controlling position given the committee, made up of the foreign ministers of the 12 member nations.

SA Board To Accept Chest Allocation

The Salvation Army advisory board Tuesday noon voted to accept the Community Chest allocation of \$10,560 to the army for 1950, and took preliminary steps toward full participation in the Chest campaign coming up in October and November.

Malcolm Epley, president of the Community Chest, explained the action of the Chest board in making this year's allocations. He said the board, in view of the over-all picture, could not budget as much as requested by most of the participating agencies, but had increased allocations over the amount they received last year.

He also pointed out that if there is an average in this year's campaign, the total will be divided proportionately among organizations whose budgets were cut by Chest board action.

Chest chairman, the Chest drive chairman, thanked the board for its action and explained that each benefiting group will be called upon to carry a special responsibility in the campaign.

The Army board members tentatively accepted the commercial division as the Army responsibility. Andrew M. Collier is the army's financial chairman.

Captain Albert Langdon of the Army reported on the recent camp held at Lake o' the Woods attended by about 45 youngsters. The camp and the Army's vacation Bible school were both reported as successful.

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Grain Shipping To Ease Storage

PORTLAND, Aug. 10 (AP)—Seven shiploads of grain to be exported in the next ten days are expected to increase Columbia river tide-water storage space.

About 2,575,000 of the 10,000,000 bushels in storage at the crammed lower river elevators will be moved, trade reports indicated. This will make room for inland grain held at country points because of a rail embargo on wheat and barley.

In addition to the seven grain shipments, several other partial loadings are expected. The grain is for export to Korea and Japan.

Government Spending To Be Channeled

WASHINGTON, Aug. 10 (AP)—The White House indicated Tuesday that government spending will be concentrated in areas where unemployment has reached 12 per cent or more.

It made public a letter by Presidential Assistant John R. Steelman. This said that an effort will be made to channel aid into the following areas where the bureau of employment security indicates such a situation had developed:

Steelman, in letters to the national defense establishment and other government officials, said that he would report soon on additional labor markets in which unemployment has reached 12 per cent or more of the available labor force.

He said the Lawrence, Mass., and Cumberland, Md., areas probably "will fall in this category."

The letter also disclosed that discussions already are under way in steps the military establishment can take to help relieve unemployment in the critical areas.
