## Teamsters To Get Hike In Pay

PORTLAND, Aug. 11 (AP)—A ten-cent hourly pay boost and a 44-hour week takes effect Monday for 450 AFL teamsters working under a state-wide agreement with creamery concerns.

A higher pay and shorter week were recommended by an arbitration board after negotiations reached a stalemate. Teamsters have been working a 48-hour week for the creameries.

The arbitration board also directed employers to make "sincere preparations" for a 40-hour week at the expiration of the new agreement, which also provides for higher overtime pay.

The agreement affects creamery workers in Portland, Eugene, Salem, Pendleton, The Dalles, Medford and Vancouver, Wash.

## House Members Eye Vacation

WASHINGTON, Aug. 11 (AP)—House members started planning hopefully today on a one-month vacation, starting possibly at the end of next week. The word has been quietly passed around in the cloakrooms that if several major bills still on the house docket can be disposed of by August 19, the house can get out of town and let the senate sweat it out alone.

Majority Leader McCormack of Massachusetts virtually assured members of a long recess yesterday. He did so in saying that house recesses might be in order after house passage of the president's arms-aid proposal and a bill for economic assistance to Korea.

"We are far ahead of the senate," McCormack noted.

## Hoover Says US Spending 'Must Stop'

FALTO ALTO, Calif., Aug. 11 (AP)—The nation today had the sober warning of its only living former president that its spending policies, if unchecked, will rob posterity of its inheritance.

Former President Herbert Hoover, in a significant address, asserted last night that the United States "is blissfully driving down the back road to collectivism at top speed."

"We have not had a great socialization of property," he said, "but we are on the last mile to collectivization through governmental collection and spending of the savings of the people."

The country's president from 1929 to 1933 spoke before an estimated 10,000 persons in the beautiful grass-capped Laurence Frost Memorial bowl on the Stanford University campus, virtually in the shadow of the Hoover institute and library on war, revolution and peace.

The occasion was his 75th birthday celebration, sponsored by the university in tribute to its most famous son, a graduate of its first class in 1885.

President Truman's message of congratulations and good wishes was among the thousands which came from all over the world. Some of them came from foreign lands where Hoover's administration of relief established his name as a great humanitarian.

Hoover headed a special commission on government organization which recently completed a two-year study with a report recommending economies of four billion dollars a year.

In his talk, broadcast by the four major networks, he assailed the costs of government.

"Along this road of spending, the government either takes over, which is socialism, or dictates institutional and economic life, which is fascism," he said.

Hoover said "Mr. Average Working Citizen" now must work 61 days a year to support local, state and federal government. Proposed additional government spending would take another 20 days' work, he said.

## Tax Millage Rate In Portland Down

PORTLAND, Aug. 11 (AP)—Tax millage rates in Portland will be down 2.5 mills the fiscal year 1949-50 despite an overall boost in budgets for the city and county agencies.

Multnomah County Assessor W. J. Fallon said an upward adjustment of commercial and industrial property valuations has permitted the millage decrease. Home owners should have slightly smaller tax bills, he said. The rate is 81 mills compared with 83.5 mills in the 1948-49 year.

Total property levies outside the city limits may range higher, however, because of school and other special district levies.
