PORTLAND, Aug. 11 (AP)—Spring wheat yields are below earlier forecasts because of drought and spring frost in Eastern Oregon.

The department of agriculture's weekly crop weather bulletin reports about 35 per cent of the spring crop harvested.

Winter wheat, of which 60 per cent is harvested, is yielding more than expected in some areas.

The bulletin said potato crop prospects are above average in Central Oregon. Klamath basin area

potatoes made a fair recovery from June frost.
