## Flying Bell Tour Marks Start Of Restoration Work On Old Mission At Jolon

The famous "Flying Bell" of Mission San Antonio de Padua, located in the Valley of the Oaks at Jolon, Calif., near King City, will visit this city on August 22, arriving here about 5 p. m. after having participated in the national convention of the Knights of Columbus at Portland, August 15 to 18. The bell will travel this time by an especially equipped automobile in the custody of John C. Sorensen from Salinas and John Walsh from Carmel, Calif. This old mission bell recently completed a tour of the Atlantic seaboard where it was rung by thousands of Americans in ceremonies at Chicago, Boston, New York and Washington, D. C., heralding an era of peace and brotherhood. Its mellow chime was broadcast from the steps of the White House over the Voice of America around the world, thereby fulfilling a hope expressed by Father Junipero Serra, founder of the California missions as he hung a mission bell from the branch of a gnarled oak at Mission San Antonio on Founders' Day, July 14, 1771, and said, "I would that these bells could be heard around the world."

## T. V. Mulkey, Lake Pioneer, Dies Saturday

LAKEVIEW, Aug. 15—Death claimed a Lake county pioneer resident, Thomas Vance Mulkey, 73, Saturday. Mr. Mulkey was born in New Pine Creek and spent his entire life in Lake county. He was for many years prominent in sheep and stock raising. Funeral services will be held at 2 p. m. Tuesday from the Owsley-Osterman mortuary in Lakeview, and interment will be in Sunset Park cemetery. Rev. Gordon C. Griffin, retired Baptist minister, will officiate. Survivors are a son, Jack, of Lakeview; two daughters, Mrs. Faye Morris of Plush and Mrs. Beulah Ekenberg of Reno, Nev.; two brothers, Frank of Adel and Ralph of Paisley; and three sisters, Mrs. Susan Benfield of Paisley, Mrs. Maggie Dickinson of Cottage Grove and Mrs. Irene Paxton of Lakeview.

# ITU Warned Cost Boost Dangerous

OAKLAND, Calif., Aug. 15 (AP)—An employer spokesman warned the International Typographical union today that any demands that will increase costs will be resisted firmly. Speaking at the opening session of the ITU annual convention, Thomas F. Henry Jr., of Detroit, said: "You are going to meet resistance this year if any demand that will increase costs."

"And there is going to be a good economic report for the firm stand that employers will take. We suggest that you analyze this situation yourselves and that you temper your demands out of an appreciation of the situation which our industry faces."

## N. H. Jones, Former KF Man, Dies

Norval Hall Jones, 63, a former well-known Klamath Falls resident, died in Salem after a lengthy illness on August 7. Mr. Jones was superintendent of the Oregon state highway shop here for many years before moving to the Willamette valley. He was born in Albany, Ore., son of pioneer Willamette valley residents, Samuel and Jane Hall Jones. He served in the air corps in the first World war and after his discharge in June 1919, went with the Oregon state highway department. He was still with the department at the time of his death, one of its oldest employees. Services were held August 9 from Rigdon mortuary, conducted by the Elks lodge. He was also a member of the Veterans of Foreign Wars. Interment was in the family plot at Jefferson.

He is survived by his widow, Winifred, of Salem, a daughter, Mrs. C. F. (Helen) Norwood, and two grandchildren, Carole Jane and Jimmy, of Medford. He was a member of the Klamath Falls Elks lodge and Reames Golf and Country club here.

## Service Station To Be Built

Ground has been broken near the Lakeview-Merrill highway junction for a modern service station. Glenn Carr, Klamath Falls, who has operated a heavy equipment sales business at the site which is near the Valley Pump company, stated that a pumice tile and frame service station will be completed this summer, and an addition for a wash room and lubrication service will be postponed until spring. Carr plans to have the building ready for occupancy by September 1.

## Gas Tax Take For Klamath Hits \$35,017

Klamath Falls will receive \$35,017 as its share of the mid-year distribution of state gasoline tax and motor vehicle revenue. It was announced by Secretary of State Earl Newberry today. This marks the first time the tax money has been doled out in mid-year. The twice-yearly payment, comprising 10 per cent of the total revenue, permits cities to undertake projects without having to borrow funds. The mid-year payment was made possible by a new state law. Bend's cut was \$21,271.
