**Women Abducted, Husbands Upset**  
NEW DELHI (AP)—Unmindful of rains, about 400 refugees squatted in the open before the relief minister's house here. They demanded immediate rehabilitation and recovery of their abducted women from Pakistan.

These refugees sat on till the evening shouting slogans. They refused to budge until Minister Mohanlal Saxena came out and assured them of his personal attention. The July rains had flooded most of their quarters rendering them homeless.

**Siam Cracks Down On Tax Evaders**  
BANGKOK (AP)—The Thai (Siam) revenue department is sending out secret agents to run down stamp tax evaders among businessmen who are mauling the government of \$1,000,000 a year.

A revenue department official said most of the evasion is done by keeping two sets of books, one to be shown revenue officials and the other to keep track of the firm's actual transactions. Foreign as well as Thai business houses join in the practice, he added.

## New Meters Get Council Okay Here

The city fathers agreed last night to order an additional 50 parking meters to be installed on a trial basis.

The new clockers will be installed on Esplanade from Pine to Wall and on Main from Baisiger's to Spring. They will be placed on both sides of the streets.

Two-hour meters will be placed on Tenth between Main and Pine for the convenience of those visiting doctor's offices in the Medical-Dental building. It will be necessary to move two-hour meters now on Pine, between Fourth and Fifth and between Tenth and Eleventh.

City Engineer E. A. Thomas was authorized to repair parking meter bases where the concrete was cracked during last winter's frigid weather.

The ordinance authorizing the sale of dog pound and cemetery property to Ellington's mill was adopted last night, after a boundary dispute had been ironed out during the week.

Installation of lights on Oregon, North Ninth, North Eleventh, North Third and East Main—okayed by the council last night—will not be approved by ordinance until the plan has been studied by a lighting engineer, councilmen decided.

A motion by Councilman Wendell Smith to advertise for bids on a tractor with shovel and blade attachments was passed by unanimous vote. The machine would

## Limit Put On Guests At Barbecue

Police Judge Leigh Ackerman reported that the city treasury now has \$10,845 from occupations tax payments.

Stamp of approval was given by the city on the Conger field lighting project, and agreed to remit full payment to Mark Smith company for the work.

Councilmen authorized the traffic safety council and police chief to install stop signs—or make any changes they deem necessary—at Shasta and Washburn way, considered one of the main traffic hazards in the city. This action followed an urgent plea by Fred Lewis, 2532 Shasta.

Gerald Lewis petitioned the council to take steps to repair curbs between Eighth and California. The job, completed several months ago, was unsatisfactory and payment to the contractor has been held up.

The upshot of the discussion resulted in an agreement by the city to notify the contractor to repair the curbs within 30 days. In the event this isn't done, the city will use the \$2700 being held up for payment and make necessary improvement.

## Limit Put On Guests At Barbecue

Scott Warren, Rotary club director in charge of this year's barbecue supper and livestock auction staged annually as the climax of the 4-H and FFA Junior Livestock show, announced today that the big outdoor feed and stock auction will be open to invited guests only due to inadequacy of fairgrounds facilities in accommodating crowds as large as those of last year.

"4-H, FFA and Rotary officials all regret that the general public cannot be accommodated," Warren said, "but last year's experience proved the infeasibility of trying to serve more than 1500 people."

"It is to be emphasized, however, that all other features of the Junior Livestock show will be open to the general public as usual," Warren stated, "also that individuals and firms not previously participating in the livestock auction are urged to make their intentions known early this year to assure accommodations at the barbecue and sales arena."

"After all, it is the prime purpose of all concerned to encourage the best efforts of the farm youth of the Klamath area with this annual show and auction, and the livestock buyer comes second only
